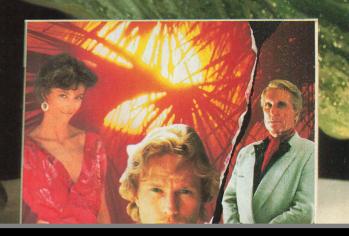

An ounce of prevention

We've gone out on a limb this month with a cover story on what many VCR owners may see as taboo: do-it-yourself VCR repairs. But after months of reader complaints about the expense and aggravation you've suffered trying to get your decks repaired for a reasonable cost in a reasonable length of time, we felt it was time to help you do more than contact Better Business Bureaus or publish angry letters about individual manufacturers.

So, for you who are willing to exercise a little courage and a lot of care, "Deck Doctor" should help you give your VCR a long, trouble-free life and minimize possible repair hassles.

At the same time, we ask you to remember the adage, "an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure." This means taking proper care of your VCR in the first place. And learning to troubleshoot for the obvious before you even think the word "repair."

Reputable electronics service centers will tell you, for instance, that most VCRs returned within 30 days of purchase need no repair. Either the owners haven't figured out how to hook them up properly or they don't know how to use the function controls. If you think this might happen to you, take your newly-purchased VCR out of its box *in the store* and have the dealer demonstrate it before you take it home. You'll see how it hooks up, how it operates and how well it works. If the store is unwilling to do this for you, take your business elsewhere.

As for real repair problems, those caused by carelessness or abuse are the most common. Service centers say that up to 80 percent of all VCR disorders are mechanical in origin and that half or more are caused by mishandling and could have been avoided. Very few have to do with faulty circuitry.

In older top-loading machines, for instance, people tend to be too forceful in putting the top down. As a result, the carriage that puts the tape into play position becomes misaligned. Even with front-loaders, people try to "force-feed" or forceably remove cassettes instead of letting the mechanism do what it's supposed to. Small children are sometimes to blame for trying to force a second tape in on top of the first. Dirt and foreign objects (anything from cookies to safety pins) are the next most likely culprits. Keeping the VCR in a clean, safe place is the obvious cautionary measure.

Beyond this, most people treat a VCR "as if they had a car and never changed the oil," says New York service store manager Jack Byalick. Furthermore, says Byalick, when their VCR develops a problem, they refuse to acknowledge that they, or someone in their household, might be the cause. He advises taking all possible precautions to treat your VCR well—including having it serviced annually, if only for a complete cleaning.

But for all of you who pride yourselves on being handy and are willing to acknowledge all causes of malfunctions—even those that are home-grown—summon up your courage, take "Deck Doctor" in hand and see if you can fix your VCR yourself.

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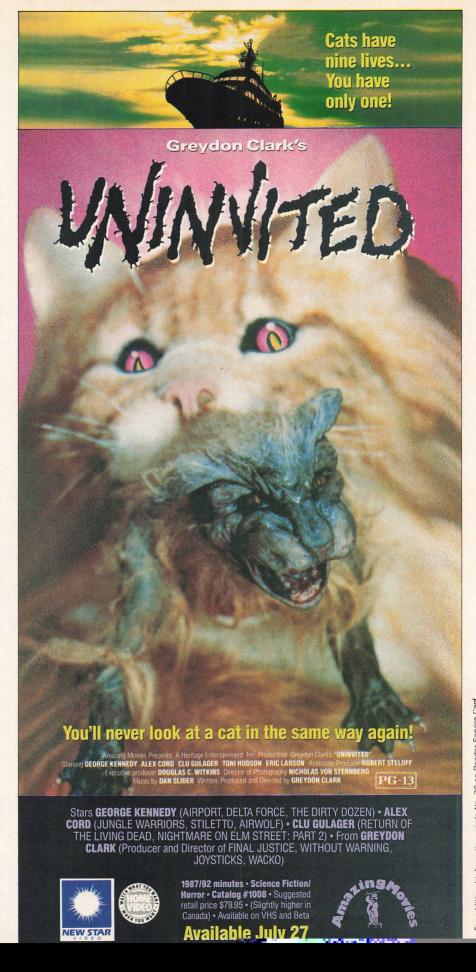

Future features

Consumers can look forward to a bounty of products with innovative features in forthcoming months. Among them are: VHS and VHS-Compact camcorders from Sharp with 12:1 zoom lenses...a hi-fi VHS VCR, also from Sharp, with a locking button on the remote to stop anyone from accidentally changing the recorder's settings...multi-disc laser players from Sanyo that can play both sides of a disc without the need to turn the disc over ... a "Home Sitter" control on JVC TVs that turns sets on and off at selected times to make a house look occupied while owners are away...a Panasonic camcorder with a loudspeaker and an LCD viewfinder...and Super-VHS-Compact camcorders with AFM stereo audio.

A thunderclap called THOR

The Tandy Corporation has stunned the electronics world by announcing it has developed a technology that uses compact discs to *record* as well as play back fully-digitized audio, video and data signals. Tandy says the system, dubbed THOR-CD, will be erasable, re-writable and, for audio, compatible with existing CD play-

ers. However, industry skeptics question Tandy's ability to deliver on its promise of a THOR-CD recorder/player for about \$500 within two years. Panasonic and Hitachi, among other companies, have already displayed prototype erasable disc systems, which they are still trying to perfect for professional markets.

Tandy's entry is aimed squarely at consumers. Although Tandy is secretive about its approach, industry experts speculate it uses a new dye-polymer disc material other firms are also investigating. One laser would write the disc by raising microscopic bumps on the polymer's surface while a second laser would erase it by smoothing out the bumps. THOR, by the way, stands for Tandy High-intensity Optical Recording.

Rewriting the rating game

Rating companies may soon be able to tell advertisers not only who watches which TV shows, but who watches which videotapes and which commercials as well as how many zip past commercials on both pre-recorded and time-shifted tapes. However, AGB Television Research says its new Finger-Printing process requires tape distributors to put an identification code (for decoding by AGB's people meter) on each cassette—a big potential hur-

dle. Nevertheless, predicts AGB President Michael J. Poehner, "It could be the turning point in making videocassettes an accepted advertising medium."

Fast Scans

Upward Bound: Blank videotape prices are on their way up. Major tape suppliers—including Maxell, Sony, Panasonic, Fuji, TDK, Maxell and BASF—are raising prices by five to 20 percent. Other companies will follow—if the leaders don't back down.

Video 101: By next year, college students will account for a quarter of the video market, spending \$1 billion to rent movies and another \$800 million to buy pre-recorded treats, according to a survey by Rock World, a college music video network.

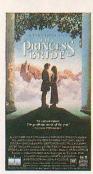

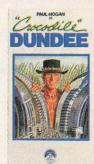

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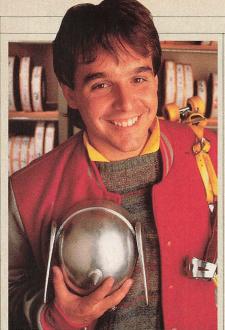

Shots in the dark

You've progressed well beyond camcorder basics and have the home videos to prove it. Friends and family don't have to be your only audience: annual video festivals across the country want your tapes for upcoming competitions.

Over 1,000 videomakers from 30 different countries submit tapes each year to the **Tokyo Video Festival**, sponsored by JVC. The contest is open to amateurs and professionals, and past entrants have ranged in age from 10 to 70. Videos on any subject and of any length should be submitted by September 10. Top prize winners will receive \$2,500 and a trip to Japan for the awards ceremony. Entry forms are available from JVC dealers.

Sony sponsors **Visions of U.S.**, one of the largest nationwide home-video events. Work can be entered in four categories—fiction, non-fiction, experimental and music video—and should run no longer than 30 minutes. There's a special award for productions by videomakers 17 or under. Judging is by film and music pros; prizes include video equipment. (Visions of U.S., Box 200, Hollywood, CA 90078; 213-856-7622.)

The American Film Institute runs the National Video Festival, a showcase

for independent video artists. Tapes of any length on any subject are due by mid-July. (Info on format restrictions and submission fees: 2021 N. Western Ave., Los Angeles, CA 90027; 213-856-7787.)

Videos produced and/or directed by women are featured in the **Women's Film and Video Festival** in Chicago. There are no length or subject limits, but entries must be on half- or three-quarter-inch VHS tape. (Women in the director's Chair, 3435 N. Sheffield Ave., Chicago, IL 60657; 312-281-4988.)

Several companies sponsor specialized contests for videomakers. Aegis has the **Desktop Video Contest** for Amiga computer owners who use Aegis programs to create desktop video. There are amateur and pro categories for tapes of up to five minutes. Entry forms are available at Amiga dealers or from Aegis.

If your video runs six minutes or less you can enter it in the **Video Shorts Festival**, held in Seattle, Washington. The entry deadline is mid-October. (Write to: Video Shorts Festival, 932 12th Ave., Seattle, WA 98122; 206-628-0838.)

The makers of Come 'N Get It dog food are running a **Canine Film Festival**. The deadline for entries (five minutes or less) is August 31; videos will be judged on pet performance and technical production. The first prize is \$20,000, so get your dogs in gear. (Send an SASE to Come 'N Get Famous Contest, 10 Universal Plaza, Suite 2600, Universal City, CA 91608.)

Disappearing act

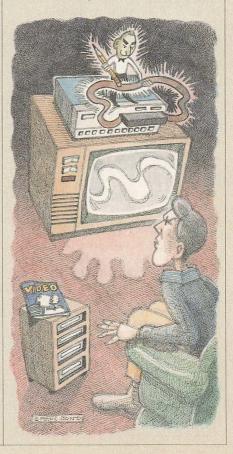
The latest thing developing in the research lab of Polaroid is a "self-destructing" videocassette. The design is such a closely guarded secret that comparisons to *Mission: Impossible* are not completely out of line. The image on the cassette would vanish after a fixed number of plays, allowing retailers and film studios to track rentals and divvy up profits more accurately. In a perfect world, it would lower tape prices.

Albert Conti, the engineer who has presided over the "Starlight Project" since it began in mid-'87, is trying to drum up interest among movie and video studios, but he demands signed confidentiality

agreements before parting with any information. "There is competition—I can't reveal the details," says Conti, who will only confirm that the device would look like an ordinary cassette and "would not damage the VCR" once the tape was played out. A Polaroid spokesman theorized "it would either be a mechanical erasing device or an electronic signal that would cause the tape to erase."

While Polaroid will not manufacture the cassette "unless we believe it will fill a need," industry reaction has ranged from caution to indignation. "This does not sound like the most elegant answer to some challenges we face," allows Jon Peisinger, president of Vestron Video. "It's a plan that seems to be fraught with greed and lack of foresight," says Steve Savage, a co-owner of New York's New Video chain. "It would result in higher rental prices. Studio execs can't sleep at night, worrying about their share."

Video sorcery: 3 new challenges

Last year's hottest Nintendo-system videogame was the company's own *The Legend of Zelda*, a challenging role-playing adventure that depends more on strategy than quick reflexes. *Zelda* became the first cartridge to sell over a million copies since the rebirth of the videogame industry.



Hack and Slash: You and a partner battle your way through an intricate dungeon in 'Gauntlet.'

Here are some challenging sword-and-sorcery-type adventures to tide you over until the arrival of *Zelda II*.

In Karnov (Data East, \$40), your character is, weirdly enough, a former circus strongman who can shoot fireballs. Karnov travels along a bizarre (actually, it's pretty ugly) landscape while trying to avoid evil characters who shoot back and throw rocks at him. Certain treasures found along the way—bombs, ladders, wings and shields—make Karnov's job easier. The ultimate goal is to slay a huge dragon and collect a lost treasure. Karnov gets repetitious after a while, and you can't save your game for later.

Wizards & Warriors (Acclaim, \$35) offers a similar challenge. Kuros runs and jumps through a series of forests (there are important clues *inside* the trees), caves and castles in search of a captured princess. The villains aren't as tough as those in Karnov, but they are much peskier. W&W also features gorgeous graphics which give the course an eerie beauty.

The most difficult new game is *Gaunt-let* (Tengen, \$45), based on Atari's arcade hit. As one of four characters—a warrior, an elf, a wizard or a valkyrie—you hack and

magic potions and, ultimately, clues that allow access to the final rooms of the maze. Gauntlet can be played solo or with a partner (which makes it much easier). The game also features a password system that lets you begin at a previously saved position.

Chan is missing

Not playing at a theater near you—any movie by Asia's number-one box-office star, Jackie Chan, heir apparent to Bruce Lee's multi-million-dollar kung-fu throne. Despite the prestige of playing the New York Film Festival last year, Chan's Police Force went the way of all his 20-odd U.S. releases: straight to video. The tapes sell briskly to fans of action-adventure: titles such as Drunken Monkey in the Tiger's Eye, Fearless Hyena, Project A and Half a Loaf of Kung Fu are considered classics.

"If you like science fiction, superheroes realized onscreen, then kung fu cinema is for you," says Richard Meyers, co-author of *From Bruce Lee to the Ninjas*.

The 34-year-old Chan began his career, like many Asian action stars, as a Bruce Lee clone. He went on to create a new genre of comedy kung fu—kinetic, disarming, exhilarating—in which he writes, directs and performs his own stunts.

Outtakes included at the end of his videotapes usually show him being carted off to the hospital on a stretcher. While filming *Armor of God*, he leapt off a castle wall, missed his mark and fractured his skull. After recovering from brain surgery, he did three more takes of the same scene. In *Police Force*, Chan plays a detective assigned

nan plays a detective assigned to protect a drug kingpin's reluctant girlfriend. (Not all women would be so reluctant: two fans have tried to commit suicide in Chan's home to gain his attention.)

Still, success in American movies eludes him. His English is tentative, although he has appeared in *Cannonball Run I* and *II* and *The Protector*. "It's going to take some far-seeing young American producer to recognize what Jackie can offer here," says Meyers. —Jami Bernard

Pre-recorded room service

You're in a strange city. There's nothing much happening, so you decide to check out the video dispenser in the hotel lobby. What will it be? *Platoon? La Bamba? Roxanne?* You punch in your room number and the bin number of a tape; the \$5.95 fee, covering a 24-hour rental and the videocassette player already in your room, will be automatically added to your bill.

This scenario is transpiring in four California hotels where Hotel Cinema Corp., in a venture with software label IVE, is testing the British-made Vertx machine. The VCPs that have been installed come from the usual suspects: Totevision, Funai, Shintom. Programming takes a definite blockbuster orientation—"the ones you

would handpick as the best of all time and the best of current releases," says Hotel Cinema president Geoffrey Gee. Does that include classics? Yes, says Gee, "though not necessarily black & white."

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Kiefer Sutherland: lost boy finds a promised land

Two years ago, he was an obscure teen actor with a famous father. Then Kiefer Sutherland started tearing up the screen—as the mean gang leader in *Stand by Me*, a vampire in *The Lost Boys* and a murderous cop in *The Killing Time*—making an indelible impression with his flair for the demonic. He was no longer "Donald Sutherland's son," but a very talented 20-year-old who couldn't be confused—or hardly even compared—with other emerging actors in his age group.

Sutherland is now demonstrating his range. In an about-face, he portrays a sensitive, isolated youth in *Promised Land*, a film of disillusionment in contemporary middle America, and a likable eccentric in the Canadian *Crazy Moon*. Sutherland worried how he would be received in *Promised Land*. "It's completely opposite from what people have been saying I do well." The

Schlock market outlook bearish

Imagine an eight-story Beverly Hills hotel where all the rooms have become sales suites. With international buyers negotiating in English, Spanish, French, German, Japanese and Swedish, movie rights are sold in hallways, in overfilled elevators and in stairwells at the American Film Market, which takes place annually in Los Angeles. This year, buyers of theatrical and video rights showed less interest in blood, gore and bare bodies than in the past. The age of schlock is apparently waning at video stores worldwide, say industry experts, as the video marketplace matures. What it will mean for consumers is a better selection of quality projects with "name" stars at the video store.

Annette on the beach

The sun is hot and you're feeling lazy. If you can't make the trek in person, maybe you'll feel like watching it on tape. Check out *Back to the Beach*, Annette Funicello and Frankie Avalon's contemporary cinematic tribute to summers (and films) past. Funicello, who came to national attention in 1955 on *The Mickey Mouse Club* and then starred in a series of Disney movies and beach pictures, went on to marry a talent agent and raise a family. She went into semi-retirement two decades ago.

"I always knew that once I got married and started having a family my career was going to fall by the wayside. It was my choice. I'm a real old-fashioned Italian lady," she says. "I prefer being at home with my husband and kids to attending any premiere or fancy affair." Home is a house in the San Fernando Valley (she has never lived by the beach) as well as a horse farm in Bakersfield, owned by her second husband, rancher Glen Holt. Through it all, she's remained friends with Avalon.

Regarding *Back to the Beach*, Funicello says, "Youngsters can enjoy it. They love the fact that Pee-Wee Herman is in the film. Teenagers can enjoy it because of the great surfing footage. And parents who were Frankie and Annette fans when we did the old ones—well, it's nostalgic for them. There's something for everyone."

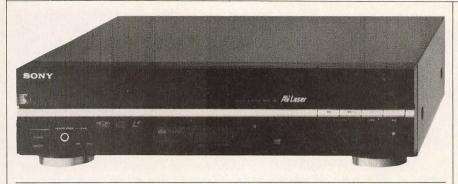

Derivative gear

I recently purchased a new Sony 27-inch monitor/receiver from a local appliance store. When I later looked through a Sony catalog, I couldn't find the model listed. Another dealer told me I bought a "derivative" model, which Sony only makes for large buying groups. Is this a standard practice in the video industry, and did I sacrifice any quality when I purchased this model?

Larger buying groups, such as department stores, often get a "customized" version of a TV or a VCR that's functionally the same as another model sold by the manufacturer to a variety of other stores. Large stores or chains like to give their products an edge against other retailers, and when they buy hundreds or thousands of units of a specific model, they can obtain such concessions from the company.

The quality of these TVs is the same as that of non-customized models. Neither Sony nor any other company would jeopardize its good name by selling an inferior model through a specialized retail outlet. But the model may differ from a similar set in some small feature. You'd have to compare the specifications listed in the instruction manuals to know the difference.

Infrared menace

I have a Sony AVH-555 audio/video selector through which I route all my audio/video gear. Most of the functions can be controlled with an infrared remote, which stopped working all of a sudden a few months ago. I kept meaning to take it in for repair, but I never got around to it and just started to operate the switcher manually. Last week, for no apparent reason, the

remote started to work again! I can't figure it out. Should I leave things the way they are, or still take it in for repair?

I've heard of intermittent infrared operation like this before. In fact, many other microprocessor-operated functions have been known to behave like this for inexplicable reasons. If it's inconvenient to take the unit in for service, I would just leave well enough alone. But don't be surprised if it conks out again. As long as you can still operate the selector (albeit without the convenience of a remote), you may want to live with it as is.

Fun with your new heads

I've seen several ads for videocassette rewinders that claim they will reduce wear and tear on the video heads inside a VCR. I thought tape didn't touch the video heads in VHS machines during rewinding. Is there something I don't know?

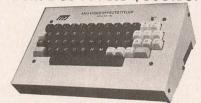

Until recently, your assumption would have been correct. But some recent models now feature "full loading" of the tape, where it threads around the drum when a cassette is inserted and remains that way until it's ejected. New machines from Akai and Toshiba offer this design, and others will likely follow. Almost all Beta decks use the same method, loading the tape against the heads for all modes. Some 8mm decks and camcorders work the same way; others return the tape to the shell for regular tape winding.

Whether there's any appreciable head wear when the tape runs across the heads is open to debate. In the shuttle mode, the tape isn't under the same tension as it is during high-speed search or play, and a slight "air bearing" between the tape and the heads helps to minimize head wear. But even if some head wear takes place, I'd easily trade that for the convenience of full-loading, which speeds up VCR operation and improves the accuracy of some other functions, such as tape editing. Of course, if you're still concerned, you can always buy the rewinder to take the wear and tear off both the heads and motors.

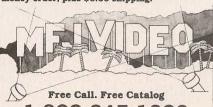

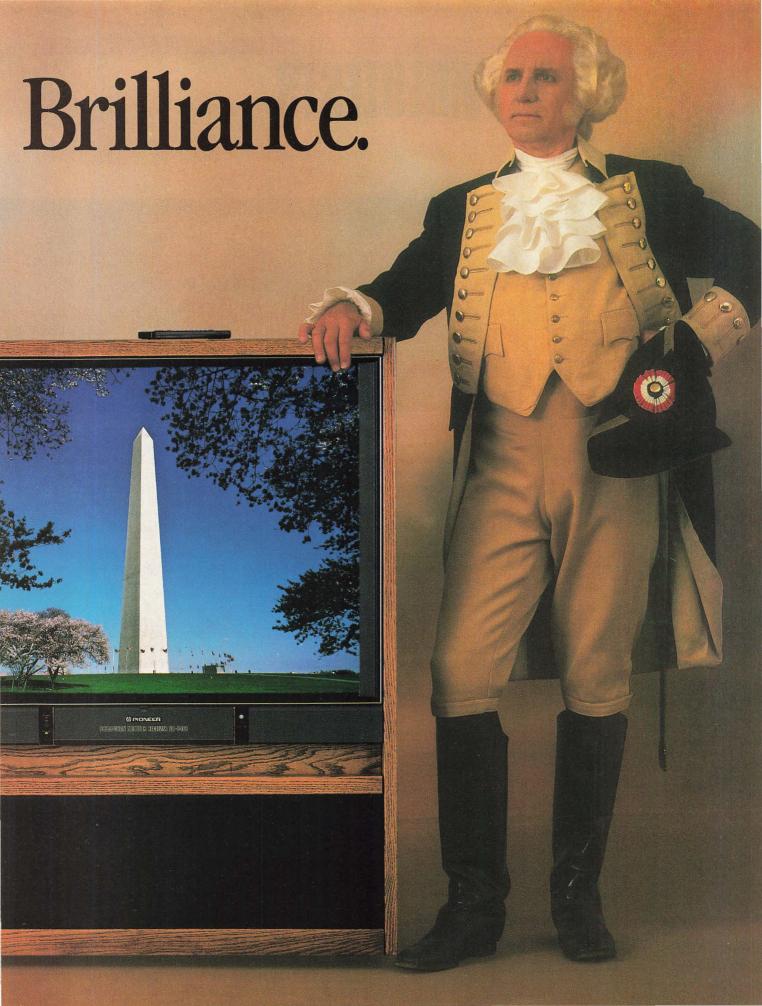

Magnavox 3-inch LCD TV

Magnavox's CH 1000 3-inch LCD TV is about the size of a fat wallet, ideal for carrying in an inside jacket pocket. It comes with a simulated leather case, the flap of which can act as a viewing hood. The TV, called Personal View, is available in red or black.

It tunes broadcast channels two through 69 and accepts video and audio signals through an optional cable. An adapter lets you substitute an external antenna for the built-in rod. You can listen to the audio through a supplied earplug which disconnects the internal speaker. The active matrix LCD screen requires light to shine through from the back, so you can view it with the screen flipped up if the ambient light is intense enough. An

internal fluorescent light illuminates the screen otherwise, halving battery life to two hours. It may be powered by five alkaline batteries, a supplied AC adapter, an optional rechargeable battery pack or an optional car adapter. An optional backlight unit provides rear illumination with the screen in the open position if the unit is powered by the AC adapter.

Description. The LCD screen occupies the upper half of the CH 1000. Just below are channel markings for VHF and UHF, with an onscreen bar to identify channel position. When a station is correctly tuned, the bar disappears after a few seconds. The lower front panel has a perforated grille over the speaker.

A telescopic rod antenna folds across the top and should be extended and positioned for best reception. Under the antenna are thumbwheel controls for brightness, color and tint. Along the left side are a loop for a carrying strap and jacks for external power, earphone and audio/video input.

The right side has an external antenna jack and the main control panel with slide switches for power and VHF/UHF, a button to recall the channel tuning bar and thumbwheels for volume and tuning. For tabletop viewing the CH 1000 comes with a stand that holds it at a comfortable angle.

Sony Video 8 Pro camcorder

Sony has taken its CCD-V110 Video 8 Pro ("Videotests," Dec. '86) one step closer to perfection with the CCD-V220 Video 8 Pro. The new model adds PCM (pulse code modulation) stereo sound with meters for each channel, a onepoint stereo microphone with a switchable low cut filter, and manual level controls that operate only when external microphones are used. Line-level left and right PCM inputs with automatic gain control are also provided for dubbing high-quality sound to the

The 220 also has a pushbutton-selectable narration mic near the operator's mouth that records to the mono AFM track without affecting the PCM sound and a jack for an external narration mic. Left and right line level outputs, a mono output and a PCM/mix/standard (AFM) switch round out the audio improvements.

Video quality has been improved as well. The 2/3-inch image sensor is now a precision CCD with 420,000 pixels gross (380,000 effective). Its improved sensitivity is helped by an f/1.2, 8x zoom lens, for a rated minimum illumination of 4 lux. Horizontal resolution of the camera portion is about 400 lines but the recorder portion remains at about 260. Shooting is made more flexible by a high-speed shutter, a processor loop, variable speed zoom; auto/manual iris, focus and white balance; and interval and frame recording. Editing and post-production features include audio dubbing, an editing connector, a flying erase head, a character generator, wipes, fades, date/time insert and an edit switch.

Description. The added features make the CCD-V220 23 ounces heavier than its predecessor. The 8x (instead of 6x) zoom lens and the larger stereo mic also increase dimensions slightly.

large characters and a third line of smaller characters, six on the left and eight on the right. Characters are available in white, blue, green, cyan, red, violet and yellow.

A third row of buttons controls one-shot autofocus in manual focus mode, fader/wiper, date, time, main title, subtitle and record review. A fourth row has slide switches for auto/manual focus and auto/indoor/outdoor white balance, a rotary control for iris with open, closed and click-stopped auto positions, and a click-stopped rotary shutter switch with positions for 1/60- (normal), 1/100-, 1/250-, 1/500-, 1/2000-, and 1/4000-second.

The narration mic is a little farther back with the push-to-narrate button directly below on the shoulder rest. All the buttons

are distinctive enough to be recognized by touch. Also on the left are the manual focus ring, the zoom ring with macro button and the electronic viewfinder, which has a focusable magnifier, a flip-up hood and a tilting viewing head.

On the right are the cassette hatch, display area and buttons for VTR power, eject, counter reset, memory and insert and switches for counter/real time display and edit. In a covered compartment are buttons for rewind, play, fast forward, stop, pause/still and frame advance and a sliding button for record.

On the shoulder rest is a slider for audio dub. Farther forward are left and right mic jacks with a dual-concentric level control for external mics and dual VU meters. Sprouting from the right is the main stereo mic with a low-cut filter switch.

The handgrip swings forward to one of three positions: straight forward, straight down and angled, at 45 degrees. The run/pause button falls under the thumb, and the tele/wide angle rocker falls under the index and middle fingers and allows variable zoom speed depending on the pressure put on it. Side compartments house the clock battery and stereo monitor ear plugs. An adjustable strap wraps around the hand and has a clip to hold the lens cap.

VCR repairs that can save you up to \$200 in service costs.

"That'll be \$85, please," says the lady at the service counter in a dull monotone, pushing the invoice under your nose. Your eyes pop as you read the red ink in the Total Due box and begin to protest, "But I only brought my VCR in for preventtive maintenance and head cleaning!" The lady at the counter arches her eyebrows. "Oh, that makes a difference," she explains. "This bill doesn't include head cleaning. That's an extra \$35."

If you've ever taken a VCR to be serviced, you know how expensive even the most basic repairs can be. Service centers must charge \$25 to \$35 just to examine a VCR and estimate repair fees. With technicians demanding more money these days, shops must keep their prices up to make a reasonable profit.

must keep their prices up to make a reasonable profit.

Is there a way around the service center blues? You bet. About 90 percent of all VCR malfunctions can be prevent-

90 percent of all VCR malfunctions can be prevented or solved by routine cleaning and maintenance procedures. You can do some yourself and save from \$50 to more than \$200. Although repairing VCRs isn't for everybody, if you have a knack for things mechanical, you owe it to yourself to try. Here's what you need to know

to keep your VCR in the best possible condition.

But first, a word of caution. Unless you are an authorized repair technician for the brand you own, taking it apart to perform the maintenance procedures outlined below will probably void the warranty. Most VCRs have a warranty period of a year; you may

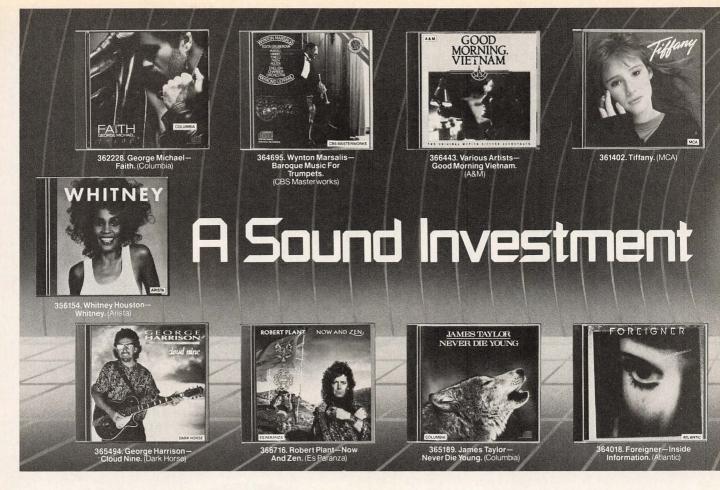
as well take advantage of it.

If Your VCR Eats A Tape

The chances a VCR will refuse to eject a tape often seem to increase in direct proportion to a tape's value. Plop in a cheap \$5 tape to record a rerun of *Moonlighting*, and your VCR will act like a perfect angel. But insert a copy of *Ghostbusters* or any other pre-recorded video costing \$20 or more, and your VCR will digest it as a main course. A VCR may eat a tape for a variety of reasons, but most instances are caused by a worn or dirty part in the transport mechanism. The most common culprits are a worn or glazed idler tire, a worn or stretched capstan belt and a worn or broken supply reel brake.

The idler tire turns the take-up and supply reels. When a deck is in play or fast-forward, the idler tire shifts against the take-up reel. In rewind, the tire presses against the supply reel. Over time, the tire can wear out, crack or glaze, reducing its friction and decreasing its effectiveness in turning reels. If the VCR is playing a tape, the idler tire may not spin the take-up reel fast enough to keep up with the tape passing through the deck. The overflow spills into the VCR and causes a serious jam.

If your VCR is eating tapes, first examine the idler tire. Look for rough spots, cracks or a glazed appearance. Try applying Re-grip cleaner (see main text). If that doesn't work, replace the tire. You can obtain a replacement tire directly from the manufacturer or from a mail-order company like MCM Electronics (858 E. Congress Park Dr., Centerville, OH 45459-4072, 513-434-0031). You can reduce wear on the idler tire by investing in a tape rewinder.

In most VCRs, the capstan motor powers the entire transport mechanism except for the video head drum. Various belts, accessible through the bottom of the deck, transfer power from the capstan motor to other places. If one or more of the belts becomes dirty, old or stretched, tapes can jam. Visually inspect the belts for age by gently twisting them. Cracks are a sure sign the rubber is exhausted. Replacement belts, which you order by diameter and size, are available either from the VCR's manufacturer or from mail-order companies.

VCRs use a metal band lined with felt as a back-tension brake. This brake is manually controlled by a lever that extends into the tape path near the supply reel. If the tape slackens as it comes out of the cassette, the brake tightens around the supply reel, restricting its motion. If the tape becomes too taut, the brake loosens, freeing the supply reel.

If the felt in the brake wears out, you risk tape spillage because the supply reel may spin freely. You can fix the problem by removing any last traces of felt from a worn brake and applying new felt, or by replacing the entire brake with a new unit.

Should you be unable to get a cassette out of a machine, remove the top cover from the VCR and carefully extract the jammed tape. If the tape is seriously crinkled or stretched, it should not be played, as it can damage the video heads.

step before proceeding. If you don't feel you have the time or talent for the task, you are better off taking the VCR to an authorized repair shop.

TAKING A VCR APART

To get inside your deck, first remove it from your video system and find a clear place to work. Loosen two or more screws and remove the top of the cabinet. The screws are usually at the rear and sometimes on the side of the deck. The bottom panel, which you don't need to remove unless you are servicing the transport mechanism, is detached by removing the screws on the bottom.

Do not loosen every screw you see, especially those on the bottom center of the cabinet because they may anchor internal components. If a screw seems to hold an internal component, retighten it and try another. The cabinet screws on some VCRs have arrows or paint marks to indicate they should be removed. If the screws on your VCR are so identified, remove only these. With top-loading VCRs remove the top plate before removing the cabinet cover. The top plate is held in place by two screws.

Save the screws in a cup. If they are of different sizes, note where each came from. You may wish to use a compartmented plastic box (like a tackle case) to save all hardware. The compartments will help you keep washers, grommets, spacers and other small items clearly organized. If necessary, write a list of the parts you remove and the order in which you remove them. Inspect the parts as you remove them to determine if they are aligned or oriented a certain way. Indicate this on your sheet so you can duplicate the steps when you put the machine back together.

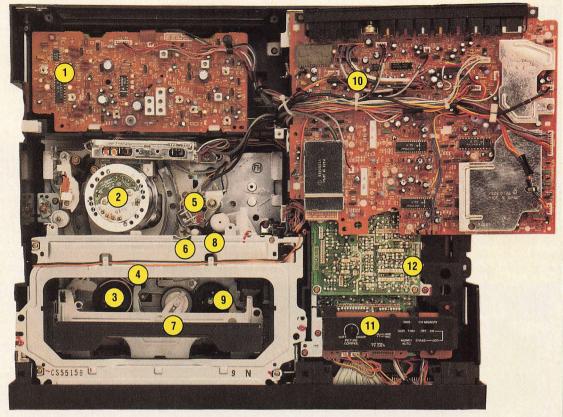
With the screws removed, lift off the VCR top. Be careful not to disturb internal components or wires. You may need to slide the cover back if it tucks under a lip in the front. Now take a few moments to acquaint yourself with the inside of the deck. Note the position of the video head drum, the loading and threading mechanisms, the main circuit board, the auxiliary

boards for the front panel, belts, tires, pulleys and the routing of the cables. Avoid touching anything, especially the head drum, unless you must. You may want to slip a tape into the deck and watch it load and thread. Note the action of all the parts.

A word of caution: Avoid operating the VCR in any position but upright, especially during threading. The tape may spill out and jam, and the resulting stress on motors and mechanical parts may lead to their premature failure.

While the top (and/or bottom) of the deck is off, be wary of the power supply board or power supply section on the main PCB. The filtering capacitors (which usually look like tall cans) retain some current even when the deck is turned off and unplugged.

Bear in mind there is little, if any, adjustment or calibration you can—or should—do inside the deck. Potentiometers on the circuit boards are factory set and an oscilloscope or special test circuitry is needed to properly adjust them. The nature of VCRs is such that there are few internal controls you can safely tweak.

INTERNAL MAINTENANCE

Clean the interior with a soft painter's brush or a photographic bulb brush. For hard-to-reach places or stubborn dust, use a can of compressed air. If the deck has a lot of dust and grime, remove them with a cotton swab dipped in alcohol or a non-petroleum based cleaner, such as Freon TF.

Cleaners or degreasers in aerosol cans may be used, but the spray is hard to control. It's better to spray the cleaner onto a cotton swab and dab that on the places you wish to clean. Wait at least three minutes for all the cleaner to evaporate before turning on the power.

Record and playback heads eventually become dirty due to an accumulation of

oxide coating shed from the tapes, or as a result of direct contact with dirt, ash or other contaminants on the tape surface. Dirty video heads create excessive dropouts—salt-and-pepper flecks that appear in the picture.

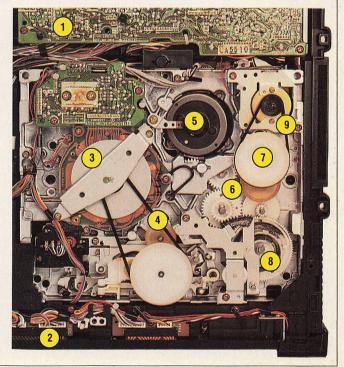
The easiest, fastest way to clean video heads is with a commercially manufactured cleaning cassette. Using it is simple: If the

cassette calls for it, apply cleaning fluid, pop the cassette into the machine and "play" it for the recommended time (usually less than 20 seconds). Some head-cleaning cassettes (particularly the "dry" kind that do not use cleaning fluid) work by abrasive action, so you'll want to avoid using the tape until you really need it. It's possible to wear down a video head by using a cleaning cassette, so follow direc-

tions carefully.

Manual cleaning requires an alcohol/Freon cleaning solution and chamoisor sponge-tipped swabs. Both are available at most electronics and video stores. Don't use a cleaning solution designed for audio heads. They sometimes have lubricants that aren't needed for video heads.

Apply the cleaner only with a chamois-tipped swab or pad. Never use cotton

swabs, as the lint can come off and become entangled in the head mechanism. You may also use a piece of clean, virgin chamois cut into a convenient one-by-one inch square. Thoroughly wet the swab and *gently* rub it sideways against the head. *Never* use an up-and-down motion; that can snap the heads right off. Most VCRs have several heads around the circumference of the drum; be sure to get them all.

One way to safely clean all the heads is to apply the swab to the side of the head drum and rotate the top of the drum with a finger. Apply only moderate pressure on the cleaning pad.

After cleaning, wait at least five minutes before inserting and playing a tape. This allows the cleaner to evaporate. If you play a tape while the heads are still wet, they will get dirty again and the oxide residue will be even harder to remove. Throw the cleaning swab or chamois away after use. Although it may still seem clean, it's not.

While you're cleaning the video heads, also thoroughly clean each metal part that comes into contact with the tape. You can use the cleaner on hard plastic parts (oxide build-up is especially noticeable on these), but not on soft rubber parts. These require a special rubber cleaner, available at most electronics stores.

What You Can Fix... And What

Following is a list of maintenance and repair tasks you should and should not attempt. It is not absolute by any means. Your level of expertise and the service materials and tools you have or can obtain will greatly influence the kind of work you can do on your VCR. If you are sure a problem lies in a component that must be replaced, and its replacement does not require critical adjustments, ask the VCR's manufacturer for a parts list. Identify the faulty component and order a replacement. You will probably be asked to pay for it in advance.

You Can:

- Clean and inspect the video heads and the stationary erase, audio and control track heads.
- Clean the exterior and interior to remove dust, nicotine and other contaminants.
- Clean or replace belts, rubber rollers and dirty or broken switches, including front panel switches.
 - Inspect and replace springs.
- Lubricate gears, shafts and other moving parts to prevent them from grinding.
 - Replace or resolder broken wires.
- Test for proper operation of the capstan, the take-up reel and the loading mechanism motors, and replace them if necessary.
- Replace the main printed circuit board (PCB), auxiliary boards (for which special handling is required) and common electronic components (resistors, capacitors, diodes) on the PCB, but only if their original values are known.

You Should Not:

- Disassemble the video head drum.
- · Replace video heads.
- Adjust the heads and guide rollers inside the deck.
- Adjust trimmer potentiometers on the main PCB without a schematic and an oscilloscope

TRANSPORT PROBLEMS

The transport threads the tape around the heads and shuttles it back and forth. Apart from dirty heads, most VCR problems are related to the transport mechanism. If your VCR is "eating" tapes, or not threading or playing them correctly, the odds are good that the trouble lies in one of the rubber belts, rollers or tires in the transport system.

Visually check the rubber tires and belts in the reel spindles, the idler tires in the tape loading mechanism (gears are sometimes used here) idler tires and the capstan pinch roller. Much of the transport

suppleness. An oily film on the rubber can indicate the VCR was lubricated excessively and that oil from mechanical sections has migrated to other components. The oil must be removed to restore proper traction. With experience, you'll learn to tell the difference between strong, healthy rubber parts and weak, sickly ones.

Rubber idler tires and pinch rollers can develop flat spots, especially if the VCR has not been used for some time. This can cause the tape to jam or the picture to jitter or flash. Replace rubber parts that look flat.

You can replace worn belts yourself. Obtain the service literature for your VCR, identify the part by its number and order it from the manufacturer. Belts and idler tires can often be ordered simply by measuring the rubber's diameter and size. Dental picks, available at most electronics and surplus outlets, let you more easily remove and install belts that are hard to reach.

Rubber rollers and belts that are slipping can be cleaned with a special cleaner called Re-grip, also available at electronic supply stores. Apply it to the belt or roller with a cotton swab or sponge applicator. Wait a few minutes, then vigorously wipe it

off with a cotton swab. Use a disposable fingernail file to sand the old, top layer. Scrape the flat of the board across the rubber in even, gentle strokes. Don't stroke more than once at any spot or you may flatten the tire or roller.

Avoid using solvent-based cleaners on rubber parts, as these chemicals can prematurely dry the rubber or, worse, melt it. Never apply any lubricant to a tire, roller or belt, as this defeats its purpose. If the rubber squeaks, it's an indication something is improperly aligned, or that the rubber needs cleaning or replacement.

Tires, belts and rollers press against plastic and metal parts. After years of use, rubber can cake up on these parts, reducing traction. While you are cleaning the idler tires, belts and pinch roller, also clean the surfaces these parts contact. Use alcohol or a non-petroleum-based solvent to clean the part. Caked-on rubber can be removed with an orange-stick from a manicure set. Pay particular attention to the capstan shaft, the reel spindle rims, the idler tire driver, the capstan motor pulley (on the underside of the deck), the capstan shaft flywheel (on the underside of the deck) and the threading/loading pulleys.

The supply and take-up reels have

brakes that prevent free movement during recording and playback. Worn brakes can cause the tape to spill and jam inside the VCR, ruining your new copy of *Top Gun*. Some VCRs use several different brakes: a band-shaped brake on the supply reel to compensate for tape slack, a brake on each reel to stop the spindles from turning after fast-forwarding or rewinding, and brake pads on both spindles to control the torque of the reels, preventing undue tape tension and backlash.

Inspect the condition of the brake pads if the tape slips or skips when you operate the VCR controls. The band brake uses a strip of felt. Be sure the felt hasn't worn off. The other brakes usually use rubber for the pads. Inspect the rubber and use Re-grip to rejuvenate it, if necessary. Clean the contact surfaces of the reel spindles with alcohol to get rid of any deposits.

CONTROL PANELS

The operating controls seldom need preventive care, unless the VCR has been subjected to heavy doses of dust, dirt, damp air or cigarette smoke. You can clean most of the controls with a brush or compressed air. The panels in most decks use

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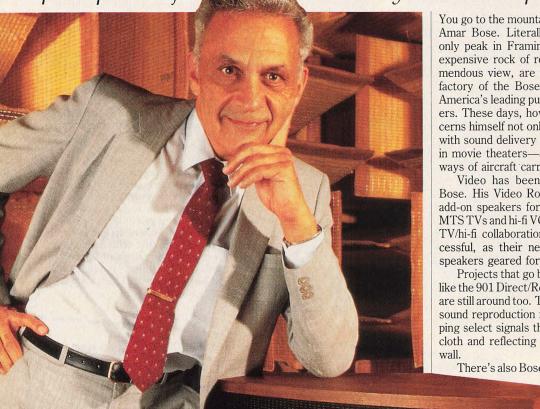
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DECIBEL'S DISCIPLE

Amar Bose's search for sonic realism may forever change our perception of video system loudspeakers.



You go to the mountain when you visit Dr. Amar Bose. Literally. Perched atop the only peak in Framingham, Mass., on an expensive rock of real estate with a tremendous view, are the headquarters and factory of the Bose Corporation, one of America's leading purveyors of loudspeakers. These days, however, Dr. Bose concerns himself not only with home hi-fi, but with sound delivery on television, in cars, in movie theaters—and even on the runways of aircraft carriers.

Video has been especially good for Bose. His Video Roommates are popular add-on speakers for a new generation of MTS TVs and hi-fi VCRs. The Bose/Zenith TV/hi-fi collaboration has also been successful, as their new line of Point Two speakers geared for both TV and music.

Projects that go back to the early days, like the 901 Direct/Reflecting loudspeaker, are still around too. The 901 revolutionized sound reproduction for the home by shipping select signals through the front grille cloth and reflecting the rest off the back wall.

There's also Bose's Acoustic Wave. In-

troduced in 1984, it's a stylish boombox that provides outstanding low-frequency sound in a small container. Too costly to fly high in the marketplace on its own, the basic technology—a compact, twisted resonant tube with an enclosed speaker—has been adapted for use in a range of subsequent home products: the Zenith/Bose Digital System 3 MTS television line, the Acoustimass speakers (puny-looking speaker pairs, with an under-the-couch profondo bass box) and, most recently, a movie house sound system called the Cannon, noted for its seat-rumbling delivery.

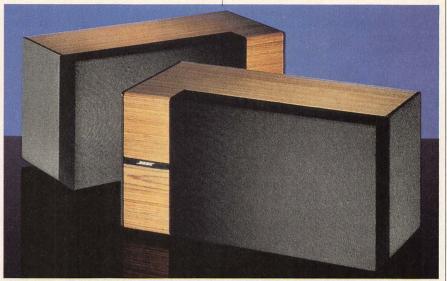
A tour of the Bose facility shows products in various stages of development. One wing is devoted exclusively to brainstorming, with several rooms just for listening.

Bose has plenty of tips for audiophiles—the result of a lifetime's worth of research on the perception of sound. You'd expect no less from a 58-year-old former violinist and engineer who began designing speakers 30 years ago because he hated the way his hi-fi sounded. He's especially eager to discuss sound for TV. Take his story about why television was invented with bad sound.

"In the early '50s," Bose recalls, "RCA conducted an experiment. They put ordinary people into a room, gave them a hi-fi with two knobs and told them to adjust the knobs to the way they liked the sound. The subjects adjusted the sets to sound like the three-inch radio loudspeakers with which they had all grown up. RCA concluded the public didn't want hi-fi. That's why, when they introduced TV, they gave consumers the same three-inch speaker with which consumers were already familiar.

Bose argues that the test consumers didn't really like the three-inch speakers, they just didn't know better. "Once somebody begins to appreciate sound that's closer to live performance, he doesn't easily settle for less," notes Bose. Nor, maintains Bose, are the TV and hi-fi businesses alike. He points out that hi-fi was built by a generation of hobbyist-entrepreneurs whose expanding basement businesses were ripe for multimillion-dollar Japanese takeovers. Television, which was a big

business from the start, has remained so.

Now audio has caught up, and Bose believes his collaboration with Zenith on a self-contained quality hi-fi stereo TV is an approach that competitors will soon follow, just as Bose's car stereo deal with General Motors/Delco brought JBL and Infinity into similar arrangements with Ford and Chrys-

Nevertheless, Bose admits that the hifi receiver/TV connection is the simplest way to glean quality sound from ordinary TVs, and he has strong opinions about how it should work. For instance, when asked how much power is needed for an audio-for-video system, Bose replies, "Power is strictly a function of how loud you want to play the system and how good the speakers are." As for speaker placement, Bose unabashedly states, "In a concert hall, you can tell what's coming from the left and the right, but this business of positioning the individual instruments in a living room is nonsense.

"The principal benefit people get from audio/video is improved sound quality, not left/right motion," says Bose. "When stereo first came out, researchers at MIT asked people to compare music playing on one speaker with the same music playing on two speakers in mono. People were shocked to realize that two speakers in mono also offered a significant gain. Left/right motion isn't as important as overall signal improvement."

Then what of surround sound? "I see it as a gimmick," says Bose. "I don't think surround will occupy much more of a position in the future than quad stereo did in the past. It suffers from the same problem: if you don't have the right software, surround sound creates a very strange effect, something you never get in real life."

Bose is equally unimpressed with MTS. "The development of television sound is no further advanced than the hi-fi business was in the '50s," he asserts.

Still, Bose has straightforward advice about buying loudspeakers. His first rule is that "spec sheets just aren't true. If you buy on specifications only, you'll pay a lot of money and not necessarily get a better product." Bose admits that it is very difficult for anyone, including himself, to pick speakers out of a store.

HI-FI HINTS

What kinds of things go wrong at retail? Take the example of a typical shopper heading to a local store to listen to a wall full of speakers. What he or she doesn't know is that when speakers are stacked together, they interact. If you play one pair of speakers and put your hand near another, you can feel it radiating by itself. "You're actually listening to a symphony of speakers," says Bose.

The shopping dilemma is also caused by limitations in human sound perception. Unless someone has a background in music, Bose says, their ears will trick them into buying an inferior product: "If you give a layman a choice among three or four different sound systems, he will almost always pick the system in which he will have the least interest two months down the line. The loss of interest will be reflected in his playing music at lower volume."

Videophiles also buy speakers these days, says Bose, and if they don't audition them for their ears the way they scrutinize TVs for picture quality, they simply aren't buying right.

Bose didn't buy his mountain on theorizing alone. "We made one decision early on: make the sound that is closest to the real situation with zero regard to initial impressions," says Bose. Made-in-America loudspeakers are still widely sold internationally, especially in Japan. Is Bose's approach what keeps the American loudspeaker market strong?

"There's actually less acoustical engineering knowledge in American companies than in the Japanese," claims Bose. "The Japanese, however, tend to do exactly what the textbooks say and those are out of date by about 30 years.

"By contrast, many in this country are convergent thinkers. They will change the mass of a cone, play with its parameters and the chances are they will come up with something good, especially if they have musical knowledge. We need more of that kind of tinkering. It's not enough to know the science. You have to couple science with psychoacoustics, electronics and music, and move forward."

Moving forward is obviously on his mind. Bose talks about "stereo everywhere" and "even better sound" as the next steps, even though he maintains that "most people who have stereo aren't experiencing the true stereo effect." He remains bullish about the future and plans to do everything in his power to nurture an "expansion in consumer sound consciousness that will fuel the industry's growth." That should keep him king of his mountain for a long time to come.

TECH TIPS

Glow in the dark

If you watch TV in a dimly lit room, and are tired of groping for the right button on your remote control, try marking the stop, play

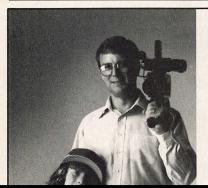
and still frame buttons with luminous stickers, available from stationery stores. Cut out a triangle for play, a square for stop and a circle for pause. The same trick can be used for the controls on a camcorder and the distance markings on its lens.

Don't touch that rewind

There are three good reasons not to rewind camcorder tapes while you're in the field: (1) it wastes the battery, (2) you risk accidentally re-using the tape if you don't immediately label it, and (3) winding when the temperature is especially hot or cold can damage the tape.

Quick on the draw

At what focal length should you set the lens on your camcorder when carrying it around? If you get in the habit of leaving it at the wide-angle position just before powering down or activating the standby mode, you'll be more likely to catch spontaneous scenes. Nine times out of ten, you'll end up using a wide angle setting over a telephoto, and you'll save time by not having re-rack the zoom lens.

ATOUCH OF CLASS

Mid-price VCRs add high-end special effects and audio.

The social middle class may be disappearing, but when it comes to home video, the middle class—VCRs priced between \$500 and \$700—is bulging at the seams. While inexpensive VCRs keep getting cheaper and high-end machines more expensive, the middle zone is filled with dozens of decks, many of which represent the best values in the video marketplace.

You won't find Super VHS in the middle range, mind you; it always takes a few years for the state of the art to trickle down to less expensive gear. You will find, however, the leftovers from yesterday's leading edge—features introduced on costly, highend models only a few years ago. Most mid-price VCRs have four video heads for improved special effects like search and still frame. Other add-ons include hi-fi audio, MTS stereo decoding, onscreen programming and index search. And a few models even add digital circuitry for special effects like picture-in-picture.

With over 70 current models of VCRs priced in the middle range (see accompanying chart), it's not easy to pick the best deal among them. At first glance most look virtually identical to each other, with the familiar flat black finish and 4-by 17-by 14-inch dimensions. But don't be blinded by industrial design. When you visit the video store, be sure to test-drive as many models as possible to get a good idea of exactly what options are available for the price. Also, remember that the prices quoted here are suggested list prices. Most of

these models will cost less at retail.

While digital technology is still largely confined to VCRs at the high end of the price scale, the trickle-down theory has brought a few digitally-enhanced decks into the \$500 to \$700 area. Toshiba's \$610 M-4285, for example, offers the increasingly popular picture-in-picture effect. PIP lets you watch a live television broadcast and a videotaped program simultaneously by superimposing a smaller screen on any corner of the full screen. The action on the inset screen can be switched to the full screen from the remote. The M-4285's other attractions include two-speed slow motion, picture search and 4-event/14-day programming.

PIP has become more and more widespread on moderately priced VCRs, including models from Craig, Fisher, GE, Hitachi,

Quasar, RCA, Sharp and Samsung. Panasonic's PV-3770 and PV-4770 both offer PIP as well as "TV memory," which provides noise-free still frames from tape or broadcast. Both are mono units, while the latter also features four video heads, onscreen programming and double-speed playback. The 3770 costs \$525, while the 4770 sells for \$600.

Betaphiles can get the most for their money with Sony's SL-810D SuperBeta deck. This \$550 model offers digital freeze frame, strobe, 1/4-speed slow motion, mosaic and solarization. This mono unit also features an edit switch, a linear time counter and a full-function remote control.

Maybe all this digital hoopla doesn't impress you. If audio is

as important to you as video, you may find these decks' lack of stereo sound a drawback. But you can also buy high-quality audio for a reasonable price.

Akai's V-565U-B, for \$699, features a souped-up audio package that includes hi-fi stereo, MTS decoding, a 10-watt-per-channel amp and audio dubbing capability. Two of the deck's four heads are dedicated to special effects such as variable speed slow motion, and it also features a comb filter, a tracking control and 6-event/14-day onscreen programming.

Fisher's FVH5550, for \$600, dedicates two heads to its hi-fi stereo and also features MTS and second audio program. Special playback modes include 9x and 24x EP picture search (5x and 8x in SP), double-speed playback, 1/2x slow motion, still frame and frame advance. CCD picture enhancement reduces visible noise, and you can program the 6-event/one-year timer from the remote control using onscreen prompts. Automatic functions include play, rewind, eject and power off.

While JVC's HR-D360U, for \$599, doesn't have hi-fi audio, it does offer linear track stereo with Dolby noise reduction. While linear track stereo isn't as rich as hi-fi, you still get the benefits of two-channel separation, and undemanding listeners may not be able to tell the difference. The HR-D360U also includes an MTS decoder and the VHS Index Search System (VISS), which places a code signal at the beginning of each recorded segment on a tape.

You can access any program instantly by simply punching in its two-digit code from the remote control.

Hitachi's VT-1450A, for \$500, is another linear track stereo model with an MTS decoder. Its digitally-interfaced remote control has an LCD screen for programming the deck's 4-event/14-day timer. One of the three video heads is dedicated to

special effects. HQ circuitry and a comb filter help enhance the picture quality.

Most VCR buyers will want to use their new toys, at least part of the time, to tape broadcast television shows to watch later. But many new video users find timeshifting somewhat daunting. They don't like having to kneel on the floor to squint at the tiny buttons and LED readouts on the front panels of their decks. Onscreen programming makes the chore a little easier, clearly displaying all the timer data on the TV screen. It's available on mid-price decks from Akai, GE, Hitachi, NEC, RCA and Sharp, among others.

JVC's HR-D410U, for \$529, allows you to use the remote control to set its 4-event/14-day timer with onscreen menus. The remote control also has an LCD screen, allowing you to program the timer with the remote and store the information in its memory. You can then transfer the information to the VCR later. The HR-D410U is a three-head machine that features a real-time counter, index search, still frame, frame advance, five-speed slow motion and a feature called "skip search," which lets you bypass tape segments from 30 to 120 seconds long.

Another recent innovation for reluctant timeshifters is bar code programming. Panasonic's PV-4722, for \$525, comes with an electronic light pen and a sheet of

bar codes. To set its 8-event/one-month timer, simply run the scanner over the appropriate codes for the date, start time, stop time and channel. The four-head machine also offers slow motion and "Omnisearch," which plays the tape at 7x speed in SP and 21x in EP.

If you're looking for a VCR that's a bit unconventional, check out Zenith's \$599 VRD230 Sidekick. The Sidekick is a vertical VCR designed to sit next to a TV rather than on top of or under it. Playback features include 1/5x slow motion and digital double-speed play with intelligible audio. The deck also has index search, a comb filter, programmable channel scan, a 4-event/14-day timer and auto play, rewind, eject and next function memory.

One of the most underrated features seen on recent VCRs is Sharp's "blue screen noise elimination" system. It's always irritating when, at the end of a videotape, the screen suddenly fills with loud static. Sharp's system replaces that snow with a silent, soft blue picture (that is now imitated by some other manufacturers). Sharp's four-head VC-M701U and VC-A601U feature blue screens along with two-speed picture search, a clean edit system, 4-event/14-day programming and automatic power on, play, rewind, stop and eject. The 601 costs \$580; the 701, which adds MTS stereo, sells for \$630.

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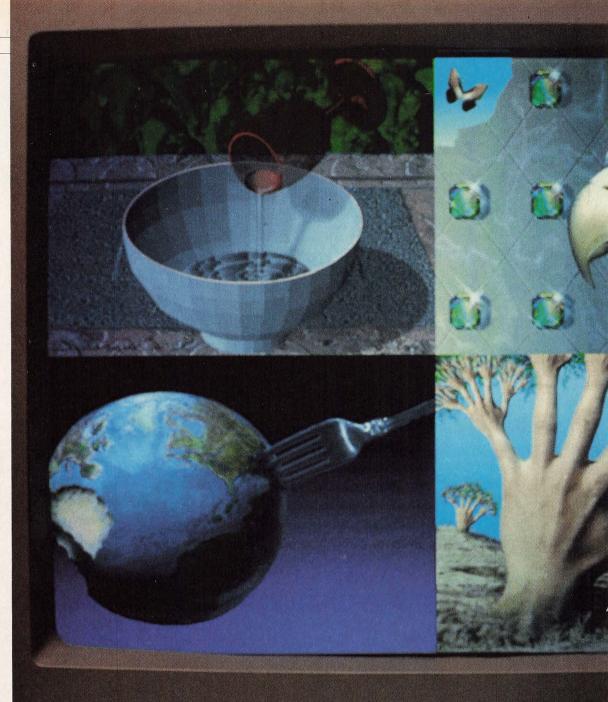

DESKTOP VIDEO

Macs & Amigas bring the excitement of dazzling graphics to homemade tapes

The first VCR held out to budding videophiles the extraordinary promise of eventually producing their own television programs. The camcorder brought the promise within reach. But the same technological revolution that was giving us inexpensive VCRs and camcorders was also giving the TV industry an amazing new arsenal of electronic video miracles based on computer technology. Now when we watch the evening news, we expect to see electronic text on the same screen, pictures over newscasters' shoulders, charts for explanations, logos that spin into view with the speed of a hummingbird. We expect computer graphics to let us see what artists once only imagined. So it should come as no surprise that this same technology is finally coming home.

Desktop video is a way of bringing professional video effects to home and business presentations using personal computers, camcorders and VCRs. The average desk or dining table can accomodate all the necessary video and computer hardware, hence the

Just as computer printers distribute the results of a computer system, the VCR can be considered the "printer" of a desktop video system. Instead of printing to paper, desktop video records to tape.

The small computers at the heart of the desktop video movement are the Apple Macintosh II and Commodore's Amiga 500 and 2000 machines. Though they range in price from about \$5,000 for the Mac II to \$595 and \$1,495 for the Amigas, they are surprisingly close in video-related capabilities. All offer entry into three areas of computer-generated video: titling and information graphics, computer graphics and animation and digital video effects. They can also digitize or mix live video with computer pictures, then record those images on any VCR.

They differ, however, in what's required to produce such videos. The Macintosh II is a high-end personal computer that needs relatively expensive additional hardware to capture video images and convert its output to a recordable NTSC television signal. The Amiga 500 and 2000 are low-cost home computers that only need inexpensive plug-in accessories to digitize video and combine computer graphics with signals from a VCR or a

Every desktop video system shares certain elements: a computer to generate and manipulate images, a camera to originate pictures ("live" video or stills from photographs or drawings), a VCR or camcorder to use as a source for editing and overdubbing, another VCR to edit and re-record and, finally, the right software—the computer programs that make it all happen. Desktop systems also take advantage of a variety of components and processes. Briefly, here's what they do:

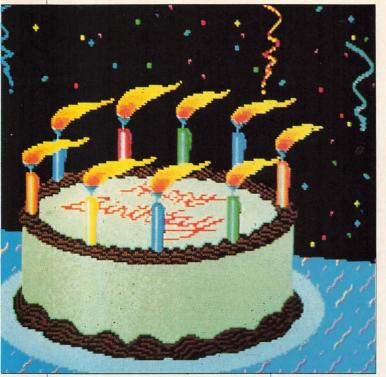
Character generators are dedicated computers that create high-quality electronic text in different colors and styles, in many cases, moving on and off screen. Video titling programs mix words with pictures, animate images and move from screen to screen with special transitions. Presentation programs further orchestrate computer video.

Gen-locks are devices that mix video signals. In a desktop system, simple hardware attachments and plug-in boards superimpose computer graphics over video from another source. Digitizers are hardware/software combinations that convert a video camera signal to the bits and bytes computers understand. Unlike a gen-lock, a digitizer stores a still

Pro Video Plus, for \$300, is a professional-quality character generator software package for the Amiga. Depending on the computer's memory (it requires an Amiga with at least one megabyte), it will let you create up to 2,600 "pages" (or screens) of high-resolution text for storage in the computer. Sixteen fonts are included in four different type styles, each in four sizes. Lines of text can be scrolled or moved on and off the screen. In addition, the program allows over 90 different transitions from screen to screen, including wipes and screen change patterns.

For those who don't need all the bells and whistles, PVS Publishing, the creator of *Pro Video Plus*, offers a lower-priced program, *Pro Video CGI*, for \$200. Both are distinguished by high-quality output and speed. They use only the computer's keyboard (rather than the mouse pointer) and closely resemble professional character generators in the way they work.

TV Text for the Amiga is a simple character generator that produces screens of high-resolution text. Produced by Brown-Wagh Publishing for \$100, it includes nine type styles in two sizes each. Text can be displayed in up to eight colors (chosen from over 4,000) and superimposed over several backgrounds, including grids, color gradations and digitized pictures. Its ability to display text with outlines and multi-color drop shadows makes characters readable against video from a VCR or camcorder.

TV Text does not animate text or allow interesting transitions. A companion program, TV Show, is designed for this purpose. It takes screens produced by TV

Text and other graphics programs and orchestrates them in motion. TV Show has 50 transition effects, including corner pulls, fades, wipes and complicated line and block effects. It is simple to learn and uses the computer's mouse to manipulate onscreen objects and text.

Aegis' Video Titler for \$50 is actually two Amiga programs in one: Titler is a text generator with special typographic effects, and Video SEG (for special effects generator) provides transition effects. Video Titler uses standard Amiga video fonts (nine interesting new ones are in the package) or

Aegis' Polyfonts, five typefaces that can be manipulated in an almost infinite variety of ways.

Video SEG performs spiral transitions, checkerboards, flips, fades, dissolves and other effects between digitized photos or pictures created with painting programs. Video Titler is also one of the few character generators so far for the Macintosh II.

Deluxe Video and Deluxe Productions are Electronic Arts' Amiga video titler and presentation programs. Deluxe Video, for \$100, is a simple, versatile program that combines pictures with animated text. While scripting a scene, Deluxe Video lets you organize and time elements with computer-generated music and digitized sounds. You play the scripts with an onscreen "remote control" patterned after a VCR's. The program includes several "scene generators" for composing formatted titles, an animated theater marquee, a screen for sports scores, a weather map and the like.

Deluxe Video operates at the Amiga's lowest resolution and is aimed squarely at amateur producers, while Deluxe Productions, for \$200, is a high-resolution program for professionals and ambitious amateurs.

Fatal Attraction

Back in the '50s and '60s, no community-conscious adult wanted to be seen sneaking out of a sex flick. So some canny film maven came up with the concept of the "art" film: nudie flicks couched in social significance whose characters spouted Proust while they humped. College professors discussed the aesthetics of Brigitte Bardot with dead seriousness. A decade later, horny teens who managed to penetrate a screening of I Am Curious (Yellow) would more likely end up slumped next to their parents than to some pervert.

Cut to the '80s. Hardcore values aside, sex is fairly well integrated into the texture of current cinema. What now passes for titillation is more than likely to be dripping off the edge of a machete as the Friday the 13th genre reigns among the sensually retarded. Now comes the slasher art film. Make the characters white collar adults who eat sushi and quote Madame Butterfly before they start slicing each other into nouvelle cuisine. Hire name actors, get a stylish director, splurge on the budget and you get a hit. Hence Fatal Attraction.

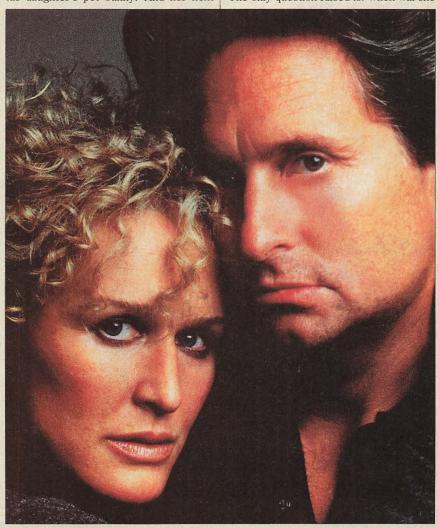
Michael Douglas portrays Dan Gallagher, a fast-track lawyer whose WASPy wife and daughter seem more like fashionable accessories than flesh and blood. His marriage is immediately established as having entered the comfortable-but-dull phase, and Gallagher is pegged as an overgrown adolescent with sex on the brain. He can get aroused just walking the dog. But having done so, he returns home to find his daughter hogging his side of the conjugal bed. Though his wife (Archer) gurgles "It's just for tonight, honey," one gets the impression that it isn't.

When the hand of fate pushes Dan into bed, sinks, elevators—virtually any available surface—with book editor Alex Forrest (Close), her effect is that of water to a man

dying of thirst. But she has a psychotic reaction to his dismissal of their weekend fling as nothing more than, well, a weekend fling. When Sunday rolls around and Dan heads for the door, Alex attempts suicide. And that's just for starters. Soon she is totally obsessed with Dan, exploding his smug little cosmos as only a scorned lunatic can. She threatens his family. She cooks his daughter's pet bunny. And her next

recipe is for Dan's goose!

Is there a logic to any of this? Not really. Any scenes offering clues to Alex's behavior evidently wound up on the cutting room floor, leaving her character so poorly defined that the soul of the film departs long before its audience. But in slasher pics, it's the threat that counts, and threaten Alex does with mechanical intensity. The only question raised is: when will she

Suspend disbelief for two hours and Fatal Attraction may pass for a slick adult thriller. It will certainly set your teeth on edge. But if you're willing to suspend disbelief, wouldn't you just as soon hang out with Freddy or Jason? At least you know what motivates them. - John Walker

ex if Larry takes out his harridan. Throw Momma is clearly intended as a black-comedy homage to Hitchcock, even employing a scene from Strangers on a Train to set the plot in motion. DeVito skillfully apes the master's familiar hallucinatory camera angles, and David Newman's score recalls music composed by Bernard Herrmann for such films as Psycho. DeVito also draws an astonishing performance from Ramsey. Momma is a true

grotesque, with a piercing, slurred bellow Larry (Crystal) is a frustrated novelist and features that hang from her face like who teaches creative writing to a crew of melting wax. (She would have been perfect inane no-talents while he tries to overcome a monumental Friday the 13th.) DeVito's Owen case of writer's block. is one of the sweetest, most Owen (DeVito) is his lamest student, partial to penning Momma Weirdest: Danny De Vito and

well-meaning murderers who has ever appeared on film. His innocence is nicely conveyed in a throwaway moment when he's discussing the deal with his uncomprehending professor. A dairy industry billboard catches his eye and he delightedly exclaims, "Cows!"

The early scenes in Larry's writing class are small comic gems, and the depiction of his writing block is appropriately excruciating. Eventually, though, Throw Momma gets bogged down in its plot machinations. Crystal's mounting hysteria becomes more annoying than amusing, and the climactic scene—from which the title is drawn-is tediously shrill. This initially intriguing movie ultimately becomes predictable and, even worse, sentimental, sacrificing its nasty edge just to make the characters more likable. Ramsey, though, remains a stunning surprise, and DeVito shows promising dexterity as a director of -Lou Kesten adult comedy.

Barfly

At one point in this stylish hangover, "distressed goddess" Wanda Wilcox (Dunaway) explains to alcoholic writer/guru Henry Chinaski (Rourke) that "the more crap you believe in, the more better off you are." It's fortunate for Charles Bukowski, who wrote Barfly's screenplay as well as the stories upon which the Chinaski character is based (collected in such books as Post Office and Love Is a Dog from Hell), that many readers—particularly in Europe—still subscribe to the myth of the suffering romantic artist, the intoxicated noble savage, the "natural" man.

How natural is Chinaski? He drinks copiously, fights furiously and has sex surprisingly often, it would seem, for a puffy, destitute, scab-ridden wino. His redeeming social qualities, on the other hand, include the ability to spout wonderful pseudo-profundities in tones and cadences somewhere between Bob Dylan, Merv Griffin and a Chris Elliot impression of Marlon Brando. (Example: "Sometimes I get tired from thinking of all the things I don't want to do. All the things I don't want

Would Chinaski/Bukowski hold our interest if he weren't—ahem—a great writer? Of course not, at least judging from the awful stuff he composes here. But that doesn't deter Tully (Alice Krige), the rich and beautiful editor of the *Contemporary Review of Art and Literature*. After "dis-

covering" Chinaski, she promptly invites him to move in with her, in spite of the melancholy roustabout's bad breath, bloody clothing and tortured body. Her obsession leads to a nasty spat with Wanda, and it comes as no surprise when Chinaski chooses the more familiar milieu in the final reel.

Director Schroeder has filmed some 50 interviews with Bukowski. Glowingly pho-

tographed by Robby Muller, *Barfly* is an entertaining yet ultimately sentimental homage to the writer—it ennobles him without adding anything substantial to his legend. *Barfly*'s look, music (mainly classical) and glamorous actors (Tom Waits would have made a good Chinaski) all seem to artificially sweeten the grunge Bukowski has spent so many difficult years articulating.

Overboard

The blockbuster *Private Benjamin* has been both boon and curse to Goldie Hawn. Ever since her winning performance in that film, she has reprised its elements in several derivative vehicles, namely *Protocol* and *Wildcats*. All three are characterized by a character transformation: at the beginning of each story she's an appealing person essentially unformed. Unusual circumstances allow her to become a fully-realized—and totally adorable—woman.

Overboard offers a slight variation: Goldie's initial character, ultimo rich bitch Joanna Stayton, is totally unappealing. She cruelly condescends to the grubby carpenter who remodels a closet on her yacht to house a shoe collection that would please Imelda Marcos. Through a laborious plot point, Joanna contracts amnesia and the carpenter, a wholesome but canny widower named Dean Profitt (Russell), contrives to convince her that she is really his wife. He brings her to his decrepit home so she can cook, clean and care for him and his four brats.

As in every Goldie Hawn vehicle, the conclusion is preordained. In this case, the politics are weirdly anti-feminist—the shrew is tamed by her adoption of a traditional domestic role. But this is a farce. after all, and director Garry Marshall—the television sitcom veteran-carries it off with a lighter hand than some previous Goldiethons. Though none of the supporting roles really catch fire (Herrmann as the rich husband and McDowall as the putupon butler are predictable; the kids are cute but not memorable), the two lead stars keep Overboard on an even keel. Russell serves as a likable straight man to Hawn's rubber-faced mugging, and the chemistry between them (based, no doubt, on their real life together) is sufficient to draw us into their romance. We wind up cheering at their inevitable reunion.

We would cheer even more if Goldie ditched the formula and attempted more complex roles, like she did in *Shampoo*.

Joe Orton. How many Americans are familiar enough with that name to grasp the reasons for a mainstream film about him? Twenty-five years ago, the young British playwright rose out of uneducated poverty to become the toast of smart society, a fresh, satiric voice whose work scandalized and captivated London and New York. His shocking death—he was murdered by his longtime lover in 1967—only increased Orton's notoriety, turning his memory into a tragic icon for those outside the sexual mainstream.

The rude triple entendre of *Prick Up Your Ears*—the title used by John Lahr for his painstaking 1978 biography—reflect Orton's naughty humor, a trait brilliantly captured by Gary Oldman in this oddly constructed but moving portrait. Framed around Lahr's book research, the story is outlined in flashbacks, supplemented by voice-over interviews with Orton's literary agent Peggy Ramsay (Redgrave) and one of his sisters (Julie Walters). Although this gambit is clumsy and unnecessary, it allows the filmmakers to get in a few gratuitous personal digs at Lahr (Shawn, at his eager, unctuous best).

The film focuses on the downward spiral of Orton's 16-year relationship with Kenneth Halliwell (Molina, also excellent in *Letter to Brezhnev*). It shows them meeting as young acting students at the Royal Academy and chronicles the remainder of their lives together: toiling in obscurity as frustrated writers, going to jail for defacing

library books, vacationing in Tangiers, picking up men for quick sex in public lavatories and, ultimately, coming apart at the seams as Orton's meteoric rise leaves Halliwell jealous and embittered. The film skirts many significant historical details (not to mention any serious consideration of Orton's work) in favor of re-creating colorful events from Orton's concupiscent diaries.

Oldman is astonishing here, free of the self-conscious posing that marred his portrayal of another British anti-hero cult figure, Sid Vicious, in the equally unromantic and sordid Sid & Nancy. He conveys randy recklessness with the same ease he captured dissolute drug addiction. Molina occasionally overdoes it as the tortured neurotic who can't live up to his failures, but he is a much more sympathetic character than Lahr's book suggests.

The film's final bit of violence is simple but appalling, so be warned. And, even in these liberated times, the kissing scenes may disturb some people. That said, *Prick Up Your Ears* is a fine if unexceptional piece of work, a clear-headed recollection of a remarkable life.

After supporting showcases in Salvador and About Last Night and a stint on Saturday Night Live, Jim Belushi's 1987

breakout vehicle—a seriocomic *Black-board Jungle* set in a drug- and violence-ravaged inner city high school—proves his talent separate and apart from his older brother and confirms his graduation from comic to comic actor.

The Principal opens with a trimmeddown Belushi as blue-collar teacher Rick Latimer, an eternal muck-up who spies his ex-wife with a well-groomed, threepiece-suited date in the local faculty gin mill. In the first of the film's Rambo-inspired, tacitly sanctioned violent sequences, Rick goes after the yuppie with a bat and makes baby food out of his BMW. His punishment is a "promotion" to Brandel High, the Rikers Island of learning institutions, in which the uncontrollable inmates, er, students, major in mayhem and hooliganism. Rick is sobered by the poverty, dope and despair the kids in his care face—the hallways look like bombed-out shelters-and, with the help of Lou Gossett Jr. in the Tonto-ish role of the school's chill security chief, decides to "make this place a school again." He does so via a kind of hip tough-love campaign. He aims to convince the students of his love and understanding and is prepared to beat it into them if necessary.

Though sloppily directed, *The Principal* moves with a jerky momentum as musical director Jellybean keeps the beat strong and the decibel level high. Credit the film's overall likability to the bumpy-faced Belushi's confident underplaying of the good-buddy persona he's spent years putting together.

A's for performance also go to the mar-

velously moody Rae Dawn Chong, who manages to transcend a tacky attempted rape scene (updated from *Up the Down Staircase*) in which the leather-jacketed Belushi and his motorcycle charge up staircases and through doors to the rescue, and to Michael Wright as the cartoon version of the ultimate manchild in the promised land, the rageful, black and beautiful leader of the bad guys.

And two weeks of detention to Dennis Feldman for *Real Men*, an idiotic spy comedy with science fiction undertones that manages to combine the special effects of *My Favorite Martian*, the budget of *Plan Nine from Outer Space* and the wit of your least favorite Jerry Lewis film—no mean feat, given the talents of both Belushi and another strongly agreeable actor, co-star John Ritter.

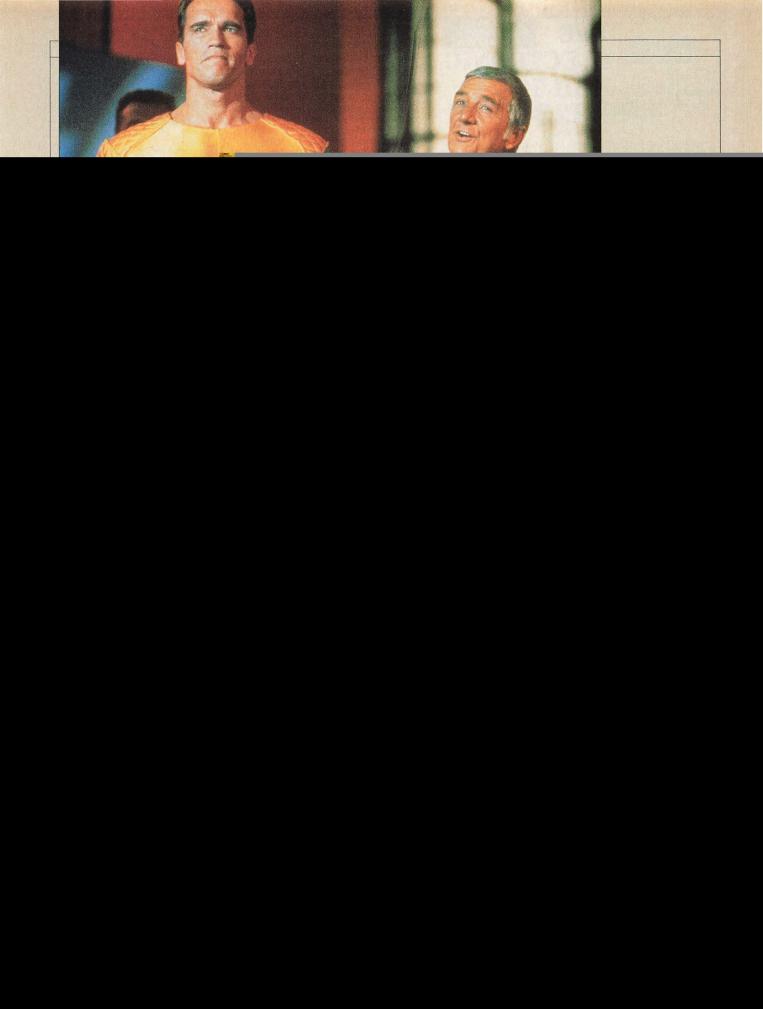
Hiding Out

From Eighteen Again to Vice Versa, there's been such a glut of role reversal comedies lately that it seems every son is really his father. Hiding Out's distinctive trick is to put both mentalities in one body. The film's hero starts out as an adult, becomes a "kid," then is forced to grow up again. That oddly humorous fate befalls narcissistic stockbroker Andrew Morenski (Cryer), whose dealings with the mob force him into the federal witness program and lead him to take shelter at his cousin's high school. After dying his hair yellow and

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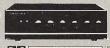
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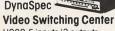


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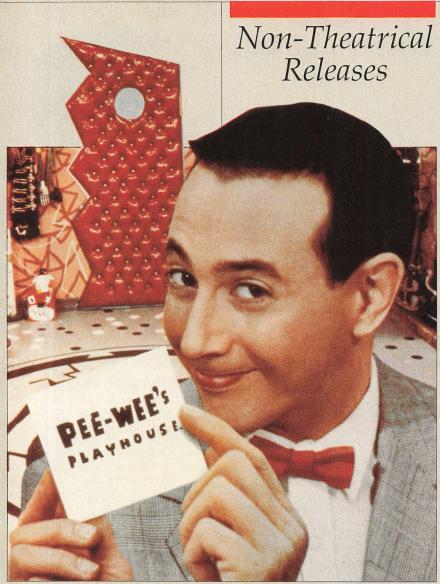

Pee-Wee's Playhouse, Volume 3

Saturday mornings haven't been the same since Pee-Wee Herman hit the airwaves two seasons ago. Superficially the chronicle of a hyperactive kid, his pals and toys in a wildly inventive fantasyland playroom, the weekly show not only obliterates the traditional confines of responsible children's programming but also provides adults with a breathtakingly original half hour of warmhearted fun. Although some crabs may find the persona intolerable, those who willingly enter Pee-Wee's magical kingdom of fascinating, three-dimensional characters are privy to rampant imagination, something formulaic TV has otherwise abandoned.

Each Playhouse has some standard fea-

tures. Among other things, there's always a secret word, which is supposed to elicit screams every time it's inadvertently spoken; a spot of claymated Penny's childish raconteuring; a visit by the King of Cartoons, bringing a vintage snippet of animated camp; and a through-the-looking-glass trip into the Magic Screen. Beyond that, the shows are an unpredictable mixture of education (e.g., good manners, simple food preparation, paper airplanes, exotic cultures), visits from such colorful characters as the bovine Cowntess, the glamorous Miss Yvonne and Cowboy Curtis, and interaction with the Playhouse gang-an array of people, puppets, animation and robots that includes Conky the computer, Globey the globe, Jambi the wish-granting genie, Pterri the pterodactyl, the anthropomorphic food inside Pee-Wee's fridge and a tiny dinosaur family that lives in the wall.

Pee-Wee's Playhouse is a kinetic explo-

sion of pop culture, post-modern wit and wholesome values. By conveying the wonder and enthusiasm of childhood, informed by adult aesthetics and a deeply subversive streak, Pee-Wee functions on numerous levels. For kids, his show is the hippest, most exciting and fast-paced entertainment on the box; for the rest of us, it's the closest modern TV has ever come to conscious pop art.

Volume 3 includes three full shows from the first season: Rainy Day, Now You See Me, Now You Don't and Cowboy Fun. (Hi-Tops is also releasing cheaper one-episode tapes. Volumes 1 and 2 contain Ice Cream Soup and Luau for Two.) While the program's award-winning quality doesn't vary much, the content does, and some shows are especially engrossing. Now there's no excuse: even chronic late risers who can't program a VCR can begin catching up on TV's cleverest offspring.

Roy Orbison & Friends: A Black & White Night

What cause, other than charity, could possibly unite Bruce Springsteen, Elvis Costello, Jackson Browne, Bonnie Raitt and Tom Waits? They all came together last September, with other pop music stars, to honor a pasty-faced, 51-year-old Texan with a singing voice that's been sending shivers down spines for over a quarter of a century.

Roy Orbison deserves this homage, even if his "friends" music bears little relation to his own. He is, after all, inimitable in delivering love-wracked ballads with a sobbing intensity that transcends melodrama. This program showcases the firstgeneration rock'n'roller on one gem after another—15 in all. Apart from the big names listed above, the core members of Orbison's band are the same players who backed Elvis Presley from his comeback to his death.

So why isn't this videotape (cablecast in January as a Cinemax special) more impressive? For one thing, Hollywood's Cocoanut Grove, smoky from an invited audience of celebs and wannabees, is hardly

the ideal site for Orbison's soul-searching hits, or even his up-tempo blues. The black & white cinematography, fine in itself, combines with the mock-deco stage backdrop for a 1930s ambience that works against the music's angst. The prime offender, though, is the relentlessly prowling and swooping camera. If you don't get motion sickness, you might start wondering whether the star of the show isn't really the large stage set.

Maybe Orbison is just a cool performer trapped in a hot medium. Can he help it if Springsteen upstages him by merely moving a step? Orbison's style is to stand stock still behind his polarized shades and let his singing do the talking. It's always worked in the past—close your eyes and it still does. But as a visual document, Roy Orbison & Friends does the Big O a disservice.

Brideshead Revisited

A literature professor of mine once shook his head when I offered to write a paper comparing two novels by Evelyn Waugh and Aldous Huxley. Waugh, he said, was a minor writer. Brideshead Re-

visited, the British TV epic based on Waugh's lengthy 1945 novel, confirms that view: its quality is self-evident but so are the severe limits of its underlying literary inspiration. Waugh's best books were comic novels with a light touch. Brideshead is something else again—an ambitious opus summing up his feelings about life, art, relationships and spirituality.

The film follows Charles Ryder (Irons), an Oxford-educated painter, as he tells two stories: of his intense friendship with Sebastian Flyte (Andrews) and his later romance with Sebastian's sister, Julia (Quick). Irons carries much of the narrative with his voiceover, so the series is talky; though Waugh's prose doesn't falter, his moral vision does. Brideshead's grim view of relationships is reminiscent of Waugh's own failed marriage. Characters are always out of step with one another; the cause is always an invisible major character: Catholicism, at first personified by Sebastian's icy mother, Lady Marchmain (Claire Bloom), whose husband (Sir Laurence Olivier) has fled to Venice to live with an exotic dancer. Sebastian Flyte lives up to his surname by following his father into alcoholic exile, leaving England and mother, but never sorrow, behind.

Waugh's spirituality is not the Catholicism of love and grace but of self-loathing and flagellation; his endorsement of self-denial at the story's end is sad proof that, however pretty his words, he really has nothing to say. Like Charles, he paints in vivid colors, but there's nothing at the end of the rainbow.

Brideshead is nonetheless a literate delight, an example of the genteel entertainment at which British television excels. Location photography of Oxford and several English manors turns the VCR into a time machine. The principals are superb and it doesn't hurt to have Olivier and John Gielgud in minor roles. Irons and Andrews project hypersensitivity without effeteness in the Oxford scenes and Quickwhen her role gains sudden prominence later in the story—is a ravishing ravenhaired beauty whose regal presence dominates the frame. Though the flaws in Waugh's vision remain irksome, this adaptation will probably remain an unequalled treasure for future generations of literature students and vidiots alike.

Rockin' Ronnie

Ronald Reagan is (and hopefully will always be) the only President in U.S. history to come to office with a full portfolio of bad movies. Rockin' Ronnie immerses the viewer in archival Reagania, showing the youthful face of our future Chief Executive (and First Lady) in old TV shows, doing soap commercials during Death Valley Days and in endless clips from the ludicrous Bedtime for Bonzo. Reagan's Hollywood blooper outtakes-see him flub lines and swear gently-only serve to humanize him. We're laughing with Reagan, not at himwhich causes one to wonder if the filmmakers were hedging their bets by not being too negative. (Reagan's biggest blooper to date, the Iran-Contra scandal, is never mentioned.)

The Rockin' Ronnie research team has unearthed hilarious forgotten footage of the Great Communicator in a variety of stagey costumes uttering weird, outof-context lines. Still, only a cursory attempt is made to link the campy clips with Reagan's folly in office. Although many a thesis has been written about his playacting career dictating his real-life Presidential decisions, Rockin' Ronnie makes no point at all. Like a Bronx cheer at a political debate, it's inappropriate, unpersuasive and counterproductive. Instead of cleverly turning this treasure-trove of embarrassing images against Reagan, the filmmakers simply revert to childish sound effects and video graffiti. Curiously, this is anti-Reagan "satire" that even Reaganites could love. -Drew Wheeler

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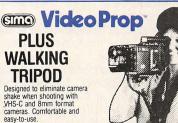
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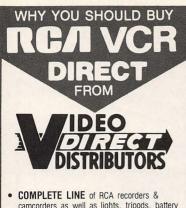

mode, shift + and shift -. At the far right are a 1/4-inch stereo headphone jack and a phone level control.

The rear panel has the AC line cord, an unswitched convenience outlet and video and stereo audio input and output jacks over two S-connectors, one each for input and output. To the right are two F-connectors for RF input and output and a channel 3/4 RF output selector. The input connector accepts CATV or VHF/UHF.

The remote control lets you set the time search or the timer and transmit the instructions to the VCR later. It controls most VCR functions as well as some compatible NEC TVs. It also adds digital features not on the VCR, such as natural/normal slow motion and strobe, which updates a still picture every 1/6-, 1/3- or 1/2-second.

Operation. Basic recording and playback functions are similar to many VCRs except that the cue/review search locks with two speeds. Still, 1/3x slow motion, normal play, 2x speed play, and three search speeds dubbed picture, speed and jet are combined in a single pair of shuttle buttons. The modes work in forward or reverse and the shuttle buttons step up or down the options with successive pushes.

The natural normal slow button determines whether there will be slight movement in each frame or if a digital assist will deliver a crisp succession of still images. Digital memory (freeze) holds a still frame while the program continues with sound. A second push of the button returns to live action.

Index scan displays about three seconds of picture at each index mark, then returns to fast forward or rewind until encountering the next index mark. To select a specific index point, push the index scan button repeatedly-say, nine times to reach the ninth marker—up to a maximum of 99. You must push the stop button before you make your selection, and the fast forward or rewind button determines the direction in which the tape will travel. Index marks are automatically recorded whenever a recording starts. There is no way to add or delete index marks. Using the real-time counter you may search for timed segments in 15-minute increments.

The DS-8000U's most useful feature is digital noise reduction with three levels of compensation. Noise reduction removes random noise (snow) from a picture but does little for patterned noise. If the picture is already good, the effect of noise reduction is marginal. It is most noticeable when source material is poor. It works

with any signal that passes through the VCR, including off-the-air broadcasts. Most of the controls on the deck and the remote are self-explanatory and easy to use. We rate ease of operation as excellent.

Performance. S-VHS recording delivers pictures with 400 lines of horizontal resolution while standard VHS delivers 250 lines. With three noise reduction options, the video signal-to-noise ratios vary widely. The figures in the test box represent S/N with no noise reduction and with the highest level of processing.

The range at SP is from 38 decibels with no processing to 49.2 dB with level III processing. Chroma AM S/Ns run from 43.5 to 49.5 dB. Chroma PM S/Ns run from 41.3 to 47.1 dB. With so many noise reduction options and two speeds in both VHS and S-VHS, some option is sure to provide a very good to excellent picture even on the worst tapes. On noise-free tapes reproduction is excellent. There is one drawback: at the highest level of noise reduction there is some blurring of fast-moving objects.

Hi-fi audio has a frequency response of 20 Hertz to 20 kilohertz, -1.6/-0.5 dB, with a dynamic range of 91.2 dB and a total harmonic distortion of 0.4 percent. Linear track audio has a -3 dB frequency response of 80 Hz to 12 kHz at SP and 80 Hz to 6.3 kHz at EP. Audio S/N is 41.1 dB and the total harmonic distortion is 1.3 percent. Audio is very good to excellent for each variety.

Conclusion. The NEC DS-8000U is a very good to excellent performer, with noise reduction that helps the EP speed look as good as the SP speed on some competitors. Super VHS and digital effects add to its desirability. At its suggested price of \$1,499 it is a very strong competitor, and we recommend it highly.

Operation. Load the batteries or supply power from one of the other sources. Do not plug in the AC adapter when dry batteries are installed because the adapter also charges the rechargeable pack, and charging causes dry batteries to explode. Turn on the power, decide whether to watch by ambient or fluorescent light and tune a station.

Adjust the volume, brightness, color and tint if necessary. You may prefer to use the earphone so as not to disturb others, or an external antenna for better reception. Either the antenna jack or the A/V connector may be used to view the output of a

VCR, but the A/V connector should yield better results. The set may be used as a color monitor in the field.

Even though the set is exceedingly easy to operate, the controls could be better arranged. The positions of the tuning wheel and the volume control require using both hands. If one were on top left and the other at top right, one-handed operation would be easier. Still, ease of operation is good to very good.

Performance. We were surprised to find that this tiny screen delivers horizontal resolution of at least 370 lines. We did not measure video or chroma signal-to-noise ratios because LCD signals are not compatible with our measuring instrument, but

noise at the A/V input seemed to be no worse than on most VCRs, in the low 40-decibel range. Color and brightness are good but highly dependent on viewing angle.

We rate picture quality as very good compared to other LCD TVs. Comparing it to small tube-type color sets is difficult because, while tubes are heavier and bulkier and have horizontal resolutions of only about 200 lines, they have more brightness, a wider viewing angle and possibly better color and contrast.

The frequency response of the speaker is 200 Hertz to 12 kilohertz with an audio S/N of 48 dB and a total harmonic distortion of 2.3 percent from signals fed into the A/V input. The frequency response at the earphone jack is about 50 Hz to 15 kHz, and you can plug in high-quality stereo headphones and get sound from both sides. Audio is average from the speaker and very good at the earphone jack.

Conclusion. The Magnavox Personal View is a very good LCD TV with surprisingly high horizontal resolution. Like all LCD screens, the viewing angle is narrow and picture quality depends on ambient light or backlighting. But for situations where a light, portable color TV or monitor is desirable it is a strong contender.

digital multi-audio, in which six PCM stereo audio tracks without video can be recorded.

It is not possible to record different audio on the AFM and PCM tracks at the same time, but you can record a second audio program instead of main (mono or left plus right) audio on the AFM track if you select SAP with the "std. audio" button. You may record to any PCM track in any order, and at the LP speed you may record up to 24 hours of audio on a single P6-120 cassette.

Description. The EV-S800 is as wide as most VHS or Beta VCRs but a bit shorter. The dial and surrounding ring on the right control jog/shuttle functions, channel selection, programming and indexing. Left of the dial is a comprehensive display above buttons for counter/time remaining, reset, return to zero, index, TV/VCR, channel (tracking/index) -, channel (tracking/index) +, rewind (search), play, fast forward (search), stop, pause/still, 2x and record. Farther left are the cassette drawer, the open/close button, the remote sensor window, an audio level display and a synchro edit indicator. At the far left are the power button, a headphone volume control and a

stereo headphone jack.

The compartment along the bottom has buttons on its door for input select, record mode (speed), sleep (turn-off time), clock set, check, clear, timer set, next and timer record on/off. On the inner wall of the compartment are mini-jacks for left and right microphones and sliders for left and right record level. Also present are buttons for synchro edit, edit (with indicator), index mark, index erase, audio dub (with indica-

tor) and standard audio, switches for audio monitor and PCM (normal, digital multi P and digital multi S) and a sharpness thumbwheel. The top of the deck has a compartment with switches for auto index, VTR 1/VTR 2 command mode, auto/manual antenna and auto stereo and buttons for up and down slow/still adjust, normal/CATV. add and erase.

At the right of the rear panel are the power cord and an unswitched conven-

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ience outlet. On the left are mini-jacks for control in and out, switches for auto/multidigital multi-play and master/slave, and a multi-pin control L jack above two rows of RCA-type pin jacks for one video/stereo audio input and two outputs. Farthest left are F connectors for cable or combined VHF/UHF input and output above a channel 3/4 RF output selector.

Operation. The EV-S800 is like a combination of Sony's first 8mm table model VCR, the EV-S700 ("Videotests," Aug. '86), and the SuperBeta SL-HF900 ("Videotests," Oct. '85). Audio, video and RF connections are standard. AFM audio, like Beta Hi-Fi audio, is recorded by the video heads and sandwiched between the chrominance and luminance signals, so audio dubbing to that track is not possible.

PCM, although recorded by the video heads, is done before the video signal starts and may be replaced at a later date.

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MTS stereo is recorded to the PCM track and either mono or SAP may be selected for AFM tracks. Multi-digital audio permits the recording of six stereo audio tracks instead of audio and video. Timer recording of either video and audio, or digital multi-audio from a source like radio is possible.

Setting the clock and timer, selecting the digital multi-track and changing the channel are all accomplished with the jog dial with the function automatically determined by the operation being performed. Digital multi-audio timer recordings can be made either serially on the same track or in parallel, with each beginning on a separate track. You cannot mix parallel and serially timed recordings. Since the VCR may record at either the SP or LP speed, it is possible to record up to four hours of audio/video or 24 hours of audio.

The shuttle ring adds the flexibility of multi-speed bi-directional playback, while the jog dial provides bi-directional frameby-frame motion through higher speeds depending on how fast you turn it. The remote duplicates the jog/shuttle dial and adds buttons for bi-directional stepping, 1/10x, 1/5x, normal speed with sound, 2x with sound in the forward direction and scan.

It also duplicates the editing controls on the deck, making frame-precise automatic assemble and insert editing possible. The VCR will operate as either master or slave and relays commands from the remote or the deck to a second machine attached by the control S or control L connectors.

The deck or the remote may be switched to control either VTR 1 or VTR 2. The remote also offers a keypad for direct chan-



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hertz, +1.6/-3 dB. On the AFM track, response is 25 Hz to 20 kHz, +0.1/-3 dB, and is down only 4.2 dB at 20 Hz. PCM dynamic range is rated at 90+ dB and measures 90.3 dB, and AFM dynamic range is 71.2 dB. Total harmonic distortion is 0.8 percent on PCM and 0.4 percent on AFM, so audio performance is excellent compared to other 8mm VCRs.

Conclusion. The Sony EV-S800 is the most versatile 8mm VCR we've tested and an ideal editing mate for the new CCD-V220 camcorder. Its picture and audio quality, jog/shuttle precision and oneevent edit controller all contribute to its desirability. With all this capability its suggested price of \$1,999 should be no surprise. We recommend it highly, especially if you own a Video 8 Pro.

them superimposed. Interval recording of eight frames every 15 seconds for up to 30 minutes lets you create simple time-lapse recordings.

Narration to the AFM track is recorded whenever the push-to-narrate button is pressed. PCM audio is recorded through the stereo mic with automatic level control. The low-cut filter reduces wind noise. PCM may also be recorded from external stereo mics, using the manual level control and VU meters to set the level correctly. or from the line-in, fixed-level jacks. You can also dub audio to the PCM track of a previous recording.

The processor loop lets you manipulate video signals between the camera and the recorder sections of the camcorder. Playback is straightforward with search, still and frame advance options. Insert editing, using the camcorder as the recorder, is almost glitch-free. Using it as the player, standard editing or synchro-editing to compatible VCRs with control L jacks is very easy. Ease of operation is excellent.

Performance. The CCD sensor is capable of about 400 lines of horizontal resolution and the f/1.2 lens delivers pictures with 50 IRE at 1.2 lux and with lower contrast levels below 1 lux. The recorder has a horizontal resolution of 260 lines with an unweighted video signal-to-noise ratio of 44.5 decibels. The weighted video S/N is 48.2 dB, the chroma AM S/N is 45.0 dB, and the chroma PM S/N is 43.8 dB. The chroma AM S/N is among the highest we've measured in any format and the other measurements are among the best we've taken on 8mm camcorders.

PCM audio has a -3 dB frequency response of 20 Hertz to 15 kilohertz, an improvement over all previously measured 8mm recorders and a match for the EV-S800 VCR also reviewed in this issue. Dynamic range is 85 dB and total harmonic distortion is 0.9 percent. AFM frequency response is 20 Hz to 20 kHz, +0.1/-2.7 dB with a dynamic range of 72.3 dB and a total harmonic distortion of 0.4 percent. Audio performance is excellent by 8mm stan-

Conclusion. The Sony CCD-V220 offers the widest range of features of any 8mm camcorder and is an ideal mate for the EV-S800 to make a compatible synchro-editing system. With a suggested price of \$2,500 it is a bit more expensive than competitors, but it offers more. It is truly a pro among 8mm camcorders. We recommend it highly for anyone who wants a flexible camera with great production capability.

sealed membrane switches, so the internal switch contacts are not affected by dirt. (The membrane switches are behind the actual buttons.) If the switches in your VCR are the regular open contact type. you may need to apply a small amount of electrical contact cleaner to dispel the dirt.

Contact cleaner dries quickly with no residue. Nevertheless, wait several minutes after cleaning before turning on the machine. Never clean the switch contacts when the machine is on or plugged into the wall socket.

REEL SPINDLES

The reel spindles rotate the supply and take-up tables as the tape travels through the transport mechanism. The action of the

spindles is very delicate, and dust or dirt can impair their performance. Use a soft brush to get rid of any accumulated dust and grime. Apply a small amount of oil to the top of the spindle. Rotate the spindle to spread the oil on the shaft. Remove the spindle only if it is exceptionally dirty or jammed. The height of the spindle is exact and is determined on most machines by the number and thickness of the small washers on the spindle shaft. If you do disassemble the spindles, be sure to put them back together in the exact same sequence.

Note the sensor under the take-up spindle. This uses infrared light to detect when the spindle is turning. If the spindle stops turning during playback (an event that can lead to tape spillage), the sensor relays the information to the VCR so it can shut itself off after three to ten seconds. Since the sensor uses light, dust, oil and grime on the spindle can impair its performance. While you have the take-up

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spindle off, use a brush to clean the sensor as well as the inside rim of the spindle.

OILS & LUBRICANTS

VCRs generally require little lubrication. After a year or two, however, it is advisable to apply small amounts of oil and grease to keep the deck in top condition. At every major preventive maintenance interval, lubricate the capstan pinch-roller, the threading mechanism, the loading mechanism and the mechanical controls. Lubricate them more often if you use your deck outdoors.

You should also lubricate the mechanical parts if you clean the deck with a spray cleaner/degreaser. The cleaner can strip oil from moving parts, and using a VCR without lubrication may wear it out prematurely. A good rule of thumb to remember when lubricating a VCR is to oil a part if it spins, and grease it if it slides or meshes.

Light machine oil is the best lubricant for spinning parts, such as the idler and roller bearings. Never use a spray-on lubricant such as WD-40. Go easy on the oil and apply it only to the rotating part. Never apply oil to the surface of a roller or where it may come into contact with the tape. Remember, more is not necessarily better. Excessive oil will gum up the tape causing clogged video heads, jammed tapes and other troubles. Never apply oil directly to a motor. For small parts, apply oil with a syringe applicator.

A high-quality machine grease is the best lubricant for sliding and meshing parts, the bulk of which are in the loading and threading assemblies and in mechanical controls (on older decks). These parts include cams, bell cranks, gear surfaces and levers. As with oiling, apply only a small dab of grease. Spread the grease by moving or sliding the part back and forth a few times. (You may need to turn the VCR on

for this.)

Use grease to lubricate the slides in the tape threading mechanism. Apply a dab of grease to the end of the slide. Cycle the deck between play and stop modes to evenly spread the lubricant. With Beta decks, repeatedly eject and insert a tape to activate the threading mechanism. You will need to insert a cassette into a VHS deck or the VCR won't respond. Use a cotton swab to soak up excess grease. If the slide is dirty, clean it before adding more grease.

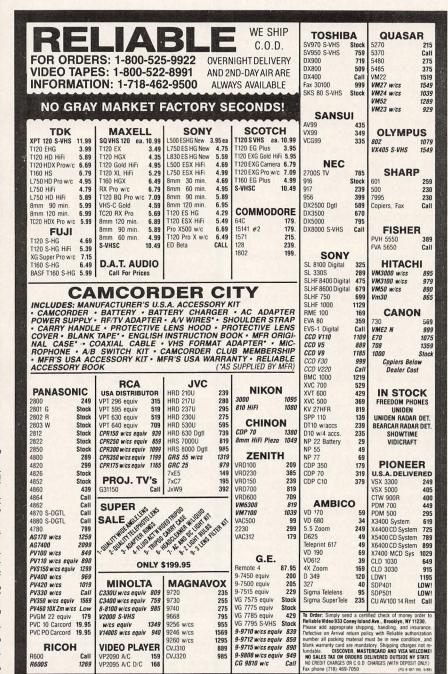
FINAL INSPECTION

Before you replace the top and bottom covers, double-check your work. Don't leave tools, hardware, used swabs or cleaning supplies inside the chassis. Make sure you have properly replaced all parts.

If all looks satisfactory, replace the covers, making sure they are aligned, and the screws. When all the screws are in place, tighten them lightly. Do not over-tighten, or you might strip the threads of the screws and the chassis.

Check the operation of the VCR once you have it back together. Use a known, good-quality tape, like a pre-recorded movie. Keep these points in mind during the checkout:

- The loading mechanism should operate smoothly and properly accept the tape.
- The tape should thread and unthread without mishap (try the sequence several times).
- The tape should play properly with full audio and video.
- The fast-forward and rewind buttons should operate properly and shuttle the tape to the end.
- The deck should automatically shut off when it reaches the end of the tape, and after rewinding.

- The tuner should properly select the different channels.
- All front panel indicators should operate normally.
- All the function buttons on the front panel and on the remote control should work properly.

The best way to keep your VCR in good condition is to perform maintenance before a problem occurs. Under normal use, you'll want to give the deck a preventive maintenance checkup every six to 12 months. By normal use, I mean a VCR operated in an average household environment, not on a factory floor or at the beach.

Just like a car fanatic who writes down everything he does with his '55 Chevy, you should keep track of all the preventive maintenance and service you perform on your VCR. For quick and easy reference, keep your service log stashed under it.

eo in real time. Color filters and sequential exposures are used to digitize still photographs and graphics in as many as 4,096 onscreen colors. Priced at \$220, Perfect Vision hardware comes with its own software.

By far the least expensive complete digitizing package is NewTek's *Digi-View* for the Amiga. Only still images can be captured, and a color filter wheel (for sequential color exposures) must be used, but the system is simple to run and the results are impressive. Digi-View captures images in up to 4,096 simultaneous onscreen colors on a standard Amiga. For digitizing black & white pictures the video signal can originate from either a videodisc player or a VCR with a steady still frame.

For editing digitized video, combining images or creating images from scratch, painting programs are necessary. Their

ry. With Aegis' \$200 Videoscape 3-D, for the Amiga, you can create animated, three-dimensional logotypes or complex, fully-shaded objects. Videoscape 3-D can use only 32 colors at one time, but it is relatively fast. Most individual frames are generated in less than ten minutes.

Ray tracing is a mathematical method to determine how light affects the surfaces of three-dimensional computer objects. Programs that use ray tracing can produce pictures with the appearance of glass, mirrors or metals. The first personal computer program to employ ray tracing is Byte by Byte's *Sculpt 3-D*, for the Amiga and (soon) the Macintosh II. *Sculpt* creates objects by combining simple, pre-defined shapes.

A complex shape is finished by pasting the cones, cubes, cylinders and the like together, then sculpting the object by pok-

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the computer picture drops out-turns transparent—so that the video underneath shows through. This technique is known as chroma-keying.

For example, when you use Computer Friends' TV Producer board for the Mac II you can drop out any of the Mac's 256 colors by setting the color with a tiny desk accessory program. Using the Amiga and any compatible gen-lock, the procedure is the same. The color that's first on the Amiga's palette is always the one that drops out.

One of the simplest, least expensive Amiga gen-locks in Mimetics' Amigen, for \$180. About the size of a small VCR remote control, it plugs into the Amiga's

RGB monitor port and draws its power from the computer itself. One connector passes the RGB video signal to the computer's monitor. Another is the video input for connecting a VCR or a camcorder. Finally, there is the video output which goes to a second (recording) VCR or a video monitor.

The Amigen produces a composite of the two video signals that's good enough to record on VHS or Beta cassettes. Considering the device's cost, it performs admirably. Without a second video signal connected to it, the Amigen also functions as an NTSC converter for the Amiga.

The costlier SuperGen (\$750) from Digital Creations, also for the Amiga, claims both broadcast quality conversion from RGB video to NTSC as well as professional-quality gen-lock overlay. The balance of computer and second-source video can be adjusted manually, and the Super-Gen is designed with special circuitry that allows automated fades to black.

Everyone has seen images that seem to flip into a scene from a distance or wrap themselves around a spinning globe. They are made possible by exotic, super-fast computers that are difficult to program and costly to run. But a new little device from New Tek with the odd name of Video Toaster performs dozens of complex scene transitions and kinetic video effects.

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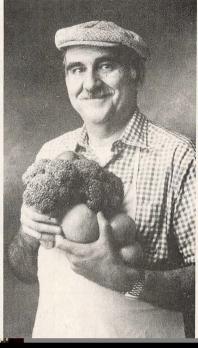
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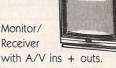

For the Amiga 2000, it consists of a board that plugs into a slot inside the machine. For the Amiga 500, it comes in a small box that connects to the computer. A version for the Macintosh II is anticipated.

A prototype previewed at presstime displayed impressive power. Color images danced around the screen, pushing each other off and on, distorting around a sphere and dissolving in complex patterns. They weren't just computer-generated pictures, but live video. In addition the Toaster's sizable memory can be used as a "frame buffer," a second source for producing high-resolution pictures beyond the Amiga's limitations. With appropriate software, it can create illustrations using millions of colors or freeze onscreen images that can be stored on disk, then edited.

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
